### Dr. W. Twyman Will Preach From April 24 to May 1

Robert S. Marsh appeared at the meeting to request a contribution to help cover the expenses of starting a fat stock show and sale in Edenton on Wednesday, May 4. The affair is sponsored by the Edenton Junior Chamber of Commerce. The Councilmen voted to make a \$100 contribution.

W. W. Byrum also attended the meeting in the interest of a cooperative campaign against rats. Mr. Byrum stated that despite the fact that the peanut mills, as well as other business concerns are

making individual fights against rats, still a considerable amount of damage is being done. It was even pointed out that a large number of rats infest adjoining fields and ditches, so that the damaging pests are getting out of control. Mr. Byrum urged Town Council to cooperate in a campaign to help get rid of some of the rats.

It was pointed out that a rat control campaign will be held in the county the last week in April, so that the Councilmen are urging citizens in Edenton to procure some of the rat poison to join in the fight. It was also decided that the town will cooperate by treating ditches which are infested, and the hope expressed that many in Edenton will put out bait during the campaign.

The Councilmen also voted to employ the League of Municipalities to reorganize the town's ordinances and the charter. The cost will be \$250, but will be included in the 1955-56 budget, for the work will not be done until after July 1.

Clerk Ernest Ward reported that city automobile plates can be secured from the State Prison at a cost of about 8 cents each over a period of three years, but that the slogan "Cradle of the Colony" must be omitted. The present cost is 22 1/2 cents each. No action was taken so that some thought can be given the matter.

Clerk Ward was authorized to advertise 1954 delinquent taxes the second Monday in May, with the sale to be held the second Monday in June.

The Street Commissioner was authorized to paint the football bleachers.
