

Program Will Be Held From 10:30 A. M. to-3:30 P. M.

On Sunday, July 31, a homecom ng day is scheduled to be held at the Rocky Hock Church, one of the oldest Baptist churches. church is 120 years old, having celebrated its centennial in 1935.

The occasion for the homecoming day is the completion of a new educational building which represents the fifth major building program in the 120 years of the history of the church.

The first building was constructed of logs. The interior lumber was rip-sawed. It was a frame building constructed about 1855 on the present site. The church was rebuilt in 1903 and 12 new classrooms were added in 1924.

The fifth and present project consists of a two-story building 45 x 70 feet of block brick construction containing 19 rooms. It was erected and equipped at a total cost of \$39,645.16. The contract was given to the Edenton Construction Company in December, 1954. The building was completed for use in May of this year. The building committee included O. C. Long, Jr., chairman, J. Gibson Perry, Tom Bunch, Murray Tynch, Sr., Raleigh Peele, Carey Evans and Mrs. Lonnie Harrell.

Rocky Hock Church has had at least 16 pastors, four of which are still living. W. F. Cale, Jr., is located at Culpepper, Va. The Rev. W. C. Francis has a church at Kannapolis, N. C., and will bring the morning address at the homecomng program. The Rev. R. E. Gordon is now serving as a missionary in the Philippines under the Bapist Foreign Mission Board.
