Edenton Police Made 35 Arrests In July

Chief of Police George L. Dail reported to Town Council Tuesday night that Edenton police made 35 arrests during July with 29 found guilty as charged. Of those arrested 19 were white males, one white female, 12 colored males and three colored females.

Fines amounted to \$395 and costs \$319.25 or a total of \$714.25, of which amount \$213.85 was turned back to the town in way of officers' fees.

During the month police answered 35 calls, investigated 5 accidents, recovered one stolen automobile, worked one funeral, reported 31 lights out, extended 15 courtesies, found 21 doors unlocked, made 21 investigations, answered one fire call and issued 527 traffic citations. The police made 640 radio calls and were on the air 53 minutes and 29 seconds.
