Its goals are to reach every person in Edenton and Chowan County with life-saving facts about cancer and to raise \$1,600 here for research, education and service to patients.

The local campaign is sponsored by the Edenton Woman's Club. Mrs. W. T. Harry and Mrs. Richard Hardin are serving as co-chairmen for the county campaign, and all of the members of the Women's Club act as volunteer workers. Mrs. West Byrum, Jr., is directing the campaign in the rural areas through the Home Demonstration Clubs. Mrs. Ella Foxwell, president of Junior Woman's Club, is directing the campaign among colored people.

April was designated as Cancer Control Month by Congress, and in proclamations by President Eisenhower, Governor Hodges, and Mayor Kehayes the public is urged to
