# County Seeking \$150,542 In Federal Funds To Cover Hurricane Drainage Damage

Bill Calling For \$5,300,000

West W. Byrum, chairman of the Chowan County Commissioners, announced early this week that the unty filed an application to secure additional federal funds to olete damage to drainage caused by hurricanes last fall.

The request is for \$150,542.44 to come from a bill introduced by Congressman Herbert Bonner which asks for an appropriation of \$5,300,000 to cover hurricane drainage damage to coastal counties in North Carolina. The bill has passed the House and is now ready for action in the Senate and the opinion is advanced that it will pass.

Work to be done in Chowan county includes removing trees and other obstructions in creeks and swamps, as well as deepen channels in some of the creeks. The project includes the following important drainage outlets Pollock Swamp, Sandy Run Creek, Rocky Hock Creek, Dillard Creek, Tiptoe Creek, Anne Creek, Middleton Stumpy Creek, Warwick Bear Swamp in Chowan County.


Accident Takes Place At Yeopim Road and Route 37


