

Chowan County' September term. of Superior Court is scheduled to begin Monday morning, Septembe 10, with what is believed to be the largest number of criminal cases docketed in recent years. The presiding judge will be Judge Walten J. Bone of Nashville.





The county fell short of its 100 pint quota which Mr. Swanner attributed to the fact that many Marines were prevented from donating due to orders issued in connection with a pending hurricane. As it was, nine Marines were able to donate a pint of blood each.
