 Ahsokie cannot be considered a push-over so that Coach Billings is taking the Aces through strenuous practice sessions in anticipation of a hard-fought game and is especially stressing the danger of over-confidence. If the Aces play the brand of ball Friday night as they did against Hertford, the chances for a victory are bright. However, if they enter the game over-confident and are the victims of an unlucky break or two, they might be in the same boat as Hertford was in their last game.

a 6-6 tie and at the end of the season Ahsokie won their first game from the Aces 6-0.
 Relations were again broken off until 1943, when Edenton won 6-0. The 1944 game resulted in a 13-7 victory for Ahsokie, but the following year the Aces were victorious 14-7. No game was scheduled again until 1949, when Ahsokie won 30-7. In 1950 the Aces slaughtered the Indians 54-0, but in the next game in 1953 Ahsokie won a hard-fought game 14-12. In the last meeting in Ahsokie in 1954, the Aces were the victims of an unlucky break in attempting to break up a pass and Ahsokie won 19-13. Last year the Aces had a comparatively easy time, winning the game by a 26-14 score.

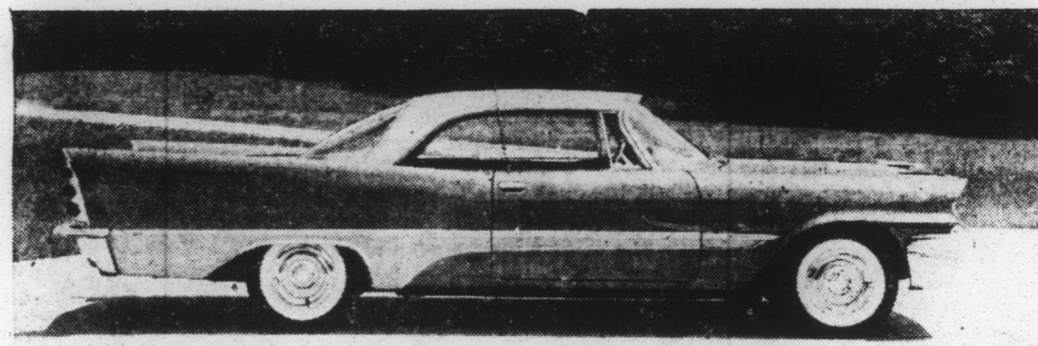

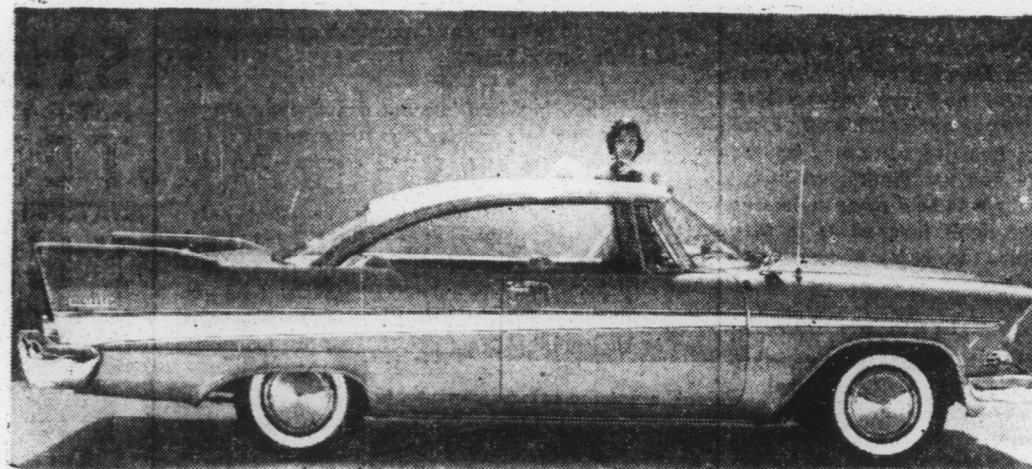
