Methodist Youth of the Elizabeth City District will hold their spring rally on Saturday, February 16, at First Methodist Church, Hertford, beginning at 10:30 A. M.

Using as their theme "I Serve", the program for the day will center around the avenues of Christ's vocations open to young people in their choice of a life work. Mrs. Elizabeth Tittsworth of Nashville, Tennessee, field representative for Scarritt College, will be featured speaker for the day which will also include announcement of plans for summer activities and introduction to the Lenten reading project. The Rev. Gene Purcell of Ahoskie, will lead a period of fellowship singing preceding the inspirational hour.

Barto Huston of Washington, District MYF president, will preside at the business session at which time a count of representatives from each local church will be made. Other district officers who will appear on the program are Charles Henry James and Maude Grey from Elizabeth City. Youth from Manteo, Gatesville, Belhaven, Plymouth and Washington are preparing skits and role playing as a means of presenting future activities for the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The Elizabeth City District is composed of 25 churches of the A. M. E. denomination with a total of 9 churches. District Directors of youth work are the Rev. L. A. Aitken of Manteo and the Rev. J. A. Aumon of Hertford. The Rev. J. A. Couchman of Elizabeth City, is director of intermediate work and the Rev. C. Freeman Heath is District Superintendent. The Councilmen look favorable to the annexation but took no action due to the forthcoming election. However if the election is defeated, the petitioners were virtually assured that the area from Pembroke Creek will be annexed on the strength of this belief.

Electric & Water Department was authorized to place an order for the materials needed for the facilities, so that the work will not be held up on account of the election. Quite a few houses are expected to be constructed when the facilities are available.

A committee reported on the approximate cost of constructing curb and gutter at the Junior-Senior High School and Mayor Ernest Kohayes was authorized to secure bids to do this work. When this work is completed it is hoped arrangements can be made with the school trustees to provide a sidewalk.

The Councilmen passed a resolution which provides for police officers to come under the social security program, to be made retroactive to January 1, 1956. The policeman will, of course, pay the back social security assessments. Another report was presented having to do with a new Municipal Building. No action was taken except for a committee composed of J. Clarence Leary and George Alma Byrum to secure approximate figures for a new building as well as rebuilding and adding to the present building used by the Police and Street Departments.

Ordinances were authorized requiring vehicles to stop when entering Latham Road from Second Street and from Eden Street to Newville Street.

Three taxicab operators had their franchise renewed for the year 1957 which included Wilford Jordan, Charlie Jernigan and Julius Roberts. Jordan has four taxicabs and Jernigan and Roberts two each.

Various reports were read and bills paid, after which the Council adjourned.

February has been called the birthday month and the party month. This, of course, is because of Valentine's Day, Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays. By what ever name you call it, it does offer mothers many occasions for special meals and parties. A dessert can be the "frosting" of a meal or party table. Here are some ideas in helping you observe the holiday season.

Pineapple Banana Pie
1 pkg. butterscotch pudding mix
1 can (14-oz.) pineapple tidbits
2 medium size bananas
1 9-inch baked pastry shell
Prepare pudding according to package directions; cool. Stir in drained pineapple and sliced bananas, reserving some of each for garnish. Spoon into baked pastry shell; chill. Garnish pie with whipped cream, pineapple and banana slices.

Valentine Dessert Brigade
Minted Fruit Sundae
Angel Cake

Coffee Nuts Candies
Minted Fruit Sundaes
1 can (1 1/2-cup) pear halves
1 can (1 1/2-cup) pitted dark sweet cherries
3 tbsp. cornstarch
1/2 tsp. mint extract
Ice cream
Angel cake

Gradually blend fruit syrups to cornstarch in medium-sized saucepan. Cook stirring constantly until sauce boils, one minute. Add fruit and mint extract. Serve warm or chilled with ice cream and angel cake. Makes 8 servings. You may prefer to provide the "making" and let people fix their own. Those who like their cake and fruit on the side can have it so; those who prefer a real sundae can arrange the minted fruit over the ice cream. A large brandy snifter makes an unusual serving piece for the fruit.

Pineapple Open-Faced Tarts
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 tbsp. cornstarch
1/4 tsp. salt
1 can (No. 2) crushed pineapple
2 tbsp. butter
4 medium tart apples
1 pint heavy cream whipped
Marachino cherries
Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt. Drain pineapple thoroughly; to the syrup add sugar and cornstarch mixture. Cook over low heat until thickened and clear, about 5 to 8 minutes. Add butter and stir until blended. Cool. Spoon into baked tart shells, top with whipped cream and garnish with cherries. Makes 6 tarts. Tarts have long been favorite American desserts. These open-faced ones have a new look and simple to prepare and serve.
