

Cecil Fry Speaker At Lions Meeting

Tells Lions About Industrial Art Courses At School

At Monday night's meeting of the Edenton Lions Club, Cecil Fry was the speaker on a program presented by Jim Partin. Fry discussed the industrial arts courses being taught at Edenton High School to 9th and 10th graders. "The purpose of industrial arts," stated the speaker, "is to familiarize boys with materials and methods used by industry, such as wood, metal and plastics, by using such methods and tools as are needed in sawing, planing, sanding, etc. It is the outgrowth of the old manual arts courses, which were usually limited to woodworking."

"As an introduction to the course, the students are taught mechanical drawing, sketching and designing, and how to read blueprints and working drawings. During the first year the students are taught something about all phases available at the high school, such as wood working, drawing, metal working, and plastics and electricity, and during the second year, as the student finds a phase of the work that interests him over others, he specializes in that phase. The purpose of the course is not to make of the boy a carpenter or electrician, but rather to introduce him to this type of work so that he may later enter it. It starts the boys on the way to a hobby and gives him a working knowledge of processes in industry as related to materials, tools and methods as well as safety."

Mr. Fry showed a group of projects done by the students in wood working. The pieces, which were cleverly executed, represented both the modern and conventional tastes in design, and especially noteworthy was the fine finish to the wood.

Three Candidates Have Opposition

In the First Ward J. Clarence Leary, incumbent, is opposed by Frank Holmes. Mr. Holmes made a bid for the seat in the 1955 election, but was defeated by Mr. Leary by a margin of 34 votes.

Three candidates are in the race for Councilman in the Second Ward. Graham Byrum, a veteran member of Town Council, is opposed by Larry Dowd and Raleigh B. Hollowell, and this contest has stirred up considerable interest.

Shortly before Friday, the deadline for willing as candidates, it appeared as though the Board of Public Works would go a-begging for enough candidates to fill the five-man board. However a generous crop of candidates filed so that eight are in the race to fill the five seats. The candidates are A. B. Harless, Philip S. McMullan and Thomas Byrum, present members, and Walter M. Wilkins, J. P. Ricks, Jr., Bruce Jones, Jr., Sidney Campen and Horace C. White.

Attention is called to the fact that unless a voter is registered on the town's registration books, he or she must register in the ward in which they live.
To be eligible to cast a ballot a voter must have lived in the state for at least a year and in Edenton at least 30 days. In event a voter has moved from one ward to another he should register in the ward in which he resides. However, if the transfer was made within 30 days a vote may be cast in the ward from which he or she moved.

Attention is also called to the fact that Saturday, May 4, before sunset is the last day a voter may register to participate in the election. The election will be held Tuesday, May 7, with the polling places open from 6:30 A. M. to 6:00 P. M.

Voters are also cautioned of the outlawing of "one-day" voting, which means that a voter must

cast for every office to be filled. Unless this is done the ballot for that particular office will be thrown out. For instance, a voter must mark two candidates for Councilman-at-Large and five for the Board of Public Works or else his vote will not be counted for any candidate.
