Order Eastern Star Calls Off Meetings

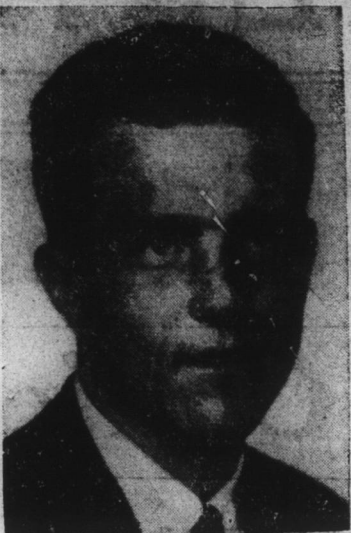
