#### Farm Accidents Take Heavy Toll

The latest available figures on farm accidents show that more than 14,000 were killed during the last 12 months. Another million injuries occurred.

"Take time to think," advises Howard Ellis, in charge of agricultural engineering for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service at State College. "North Carolina contributes its full share to this tragic loss of life on our farms."

A report on the Fourth District Rural Health Conference held recently at Wilson clearly proved that the physicians in the state are well aware of the increasing number of farm and home accidents, and they want to participate in any and all educational efforts to stress caution and safety practices, says Ellis.

"In general, safety is a practice that the average person feels that everybody else should practice," Ellis says. "Most of us can excuse our personal errors because we fully realize why we took the chance. We are not as inclined to excuse the other fellow because we observe the chance he takes without listening to his reasons. We should each of us stop and think."
