Guard Interviews - Activities

The purpose of this column is to familiarize residents of Edenton, Chowan County and surrounding area with the personnel and activities of the local Heavy Mortar Company, 119th Infantry, 30th Division of the North Carolina National Guard. One or more members of the Company will be interviewed each week along with publication of weekly activities and notes concerning the local company.

INTERVIEWS

1st Lt. Charlie W. Swanner— This week's interview features 1st Lt. Charlie Swanner, a valuable officer in the local company, with over 12 years active and National Guard service. Lt. Swanner's military career began on July 31, 1942, when he enlisted in the U. S. Navy. After completion of basic training at Camp Allen, Norfolk, Va., he attended Gunnery School at Camp Bradford, Va. During this school he qualified with the U. S. Rifle Cal. 30, Pistol Cal. 45, and Machine Guns Cal. 30 and Cal. 50.

After completing Gunnery School Lt. Swanner was assigned to the 32nd Construction Bn. He went overseas with this battalion on December 11, 1942 and served in the Aleutian Islands as Gunner's Mate until February 12, 1944 and on the Admiralty Islands for 14 months. He received his discharge from the U. S. Navy on November 14, 1945 as Petty Officer 1st Class.

Lt. Swanner enlisted in the local company on June 23, 1948 as

a private. His performance of duty was outstanding and he was recommended for commission as 2nd Lieutenant July 1, 1949. He appeared before an examining board at National Guard Headquarters in Raleigh July 14, 1949 and was found qualified for a commission as 2nd Lieutenant. He has completed the 10 Series which consists of 16 courses from the Army General School, Fort Riley, Kansas, March 21, 1950, the 20 Series from the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia required for the grade of Captain, and is currently working on the 30 Series which consists of Advanced Infantry subjects.

Swanner was promoted to 1st Lt. on August 3, 1951. His present assignment in the company is Recon Officer (second in command).

Lt. Swanner has been awarded the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal, American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and the Armed Forces Reserve Medal.

Lt. Swanner is married to the former Grace White. They have two sons, Charles and Gary.

Taxes In New Area Clarified

Ernest J. Ward, Jr., town clerk, recently had some complaint from residents in the newly annexed area of Edenton on the basis that their 1957 property taxes should be paid on a pro-rata basis from March 18, 1957, to December 31, 1958.

According to Mr. Ward, the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, Chapter 160-445, the newly annexed territory shall be subject to municipal taxes levied for the fiscal year following the date of annexation.

It is Mr. Ward's understanding that taxes are listed on January 1 for a calendar year in order that towns and counties may have an opportunity to establish the total property valuation prior to making a budget for a fiscal year and that property listed on January 1 is subject to taxes for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Mr. Ward wrote to the North Carolina League of Municipalities for information and S. Leigh Wilson, assistant executive director, wrote Mr. Ward in part as follows:

"You are correct in that property taxes are levied in an area annexed for the fiscal year following the date of annexation. You are also correct in that taxes are listed as of January 1 in order that the total property valuation can be determined and taxes levied for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

"There is no authority for a municipality to prorate taxes for property which has been annexed. Property annexed to a municipali-

ty is subject to taxes as listed by the owner on January 1, provided the property annexed becomes a part of the municipality prior to July 1."

Miss Ellen V. Oliver, 85, died Monday morning at 2:30 o'clock at the home of her brother, J. J. Oliver in the Rocky Hook section. She was a native of Chowan County and had been ill only two days.

Surviving are one brother, J. J. Oliver, and three sisters, Mrs. Sarah Harrell, Mrs. Martha Peele and Mrs. Pruden Ashley, all of Chowan County.

She was a member of the Rocky Hook Baptist Church, where funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The pastor, the Rev. B. L. Raines, officiated and burial was in the family cemetery in the Rocky Hook section.

Pallbearers were Carl Ober, David Ober, Ray Byrum, Roland Ashley, John S. Bunch and Lewis Bunch.
