

KNOW YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

P. E. Bettendorf, representative of the Social Security Administration, is in Edenton every Thursday at the North Carolina Employment Security Commission in Citizens Bank Building.

1. Question: As a farmer operator I employ a number of short-term laborers; when should I begin deducting social security taxes?

Answer: Immediately. The tax reductions can easily be returned to those workers who do not meet the agricultural labor tests.

2. Question: I plan on putting some of my acreage into the Soil Bank. Do I count these payments for social security?

Answer: Yes. Payments under the Federal Soil Bank Act of 1956 for acreage-reserve and conservation-reserve programs represent ordinary income to farm operators and are includable in computing net farm earnings.

3. Question: I reported on the optional method the last two years. Must I continue to report on the optional method?

Answer: No. You may change your method of reporting from year to year. For instance, you reported on the optional method for 1956, but can report on the actual net basis for 1957 if you so desire.

4. Question: How should I report a farm laborer who has left my employ before I recorded his social security number?

Answer: If you are unable to obtain his social security number, report his mailing address so that he may be contacted directly in order to get the information necessary to credit his social security account with the wages paid.

5. Question: I filed tax returns for 1955 and 1956 but reported a loss on my farm income for both years. Is it too late to file these returns on the optional method and receive credit under social security?

Answer: You may amend your report to the District Director of Internal Revenue for any tax year if you file your amended returns within three years, three months and fifteen days after the end of the tax year in question. After this period has elapsed, it is ordinarily not possible to change your status with respect to closed tax years. Thus, you have until April 15, 1959, to correct 1955 and an additional year for 1956 corrections.
