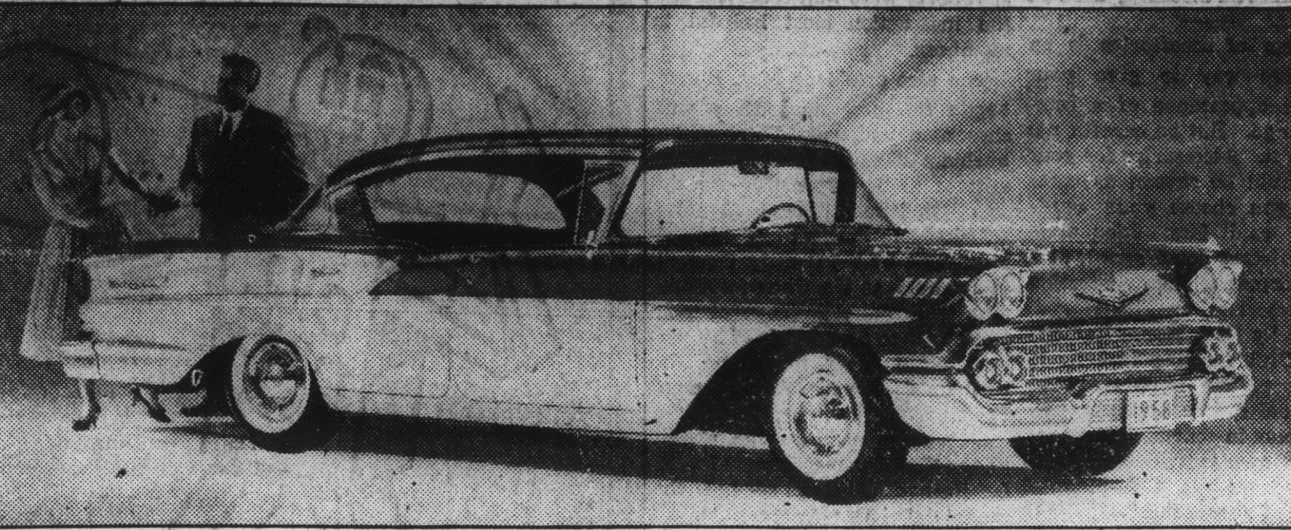

## New Regulations Affect Fishing

Cage Hayman this week calls attention to some of the regulations adopted early this month by the Board of Conservation and Development.

Two of the regulations apply locally one being that it shall be lawful during the shad season to set gill nets to take shad and rock between the Highway Bridge across Albemarle Sound at Pea Ridge and the Norfolk Southern railroad bridge five miles west; but it shall be unlawful to set such gill nets for rock and shad west of the Norfolk Southern railroad bridge; provided that no nets of any description shall be set within three hundred yards of either side of the two bridges.

Another new regulation provides that it shall be lawful during the herring season to set gill nets of not more than one and a half inch bar in Chowan River and that part of Albemarle Sound above Norfolk Southern Bridge for purpose of catching herring.
