

Free Rat Poison Correct Listing Is Available In Library Hours Chowan County

K. J. Eyer, sanitarian for the District Health Department, announces that the Health Department recently prepared 1,000 pounds of rat poison to be used in Chowan County.

This continued rat campaign is sponsored by the County Commissioners in cooperation with State and local Health Departments.

The poison is free and can be secured at the Health Department and County Agent's office.

The Health Department points out that the mixture is a poison, but that instructions are given with each package of bait, which should be read carefully and carried out. It also contains instructions for making a bait box which prevents domestic animals from getting to the poison.

Due to recent cold weather, many persons have complained about the increase of the presence of rats. Persons having rats are asked to cooperate in securing poison and its proper use in helping to eliminate the rat population.

Bank Donates To Chowan College
