

Edenton Aces Will Begin Basketball Season Dec. 13th

First Game Scheduled With Elizabeth City Yellow Jackets

The Edenton Aces will open their 1957-58 basketball season at 8 o'clock Friday night when they take on the Elizabeth City Yellow Jackets in the high school gymnasium.

The Junior Varsity will open at 7 o'clock against the Baby Jackets.

As of Wednesday berths on the team were not final, but all the boys have been practicing hard to give the Elizabeth City quintet some opposition. The team is hampered somewhat due to the fact that practice just started on Monday because of the extended football season. Another difficulty is that none of the boys stretch far over six feet, and only a few reach this far.

But, in spite of this, Coach Alton Brooks hopes to put forth the same type of scrappy team that took the Albemarle Conference crown and moved into the state class A playoffs last year. The Aces were knocked out of the running by Scotland Neck, who were eliminated by powerful Williamston.

The Aces and Jayvees will travel to Washington next Tuesday to play the highly touted Pam Pack.
