Continued from Page 1—Section I items. July 18—Alton Brooks announced plans for a fishing rodeo for boys and girls between 6 and 15 years of age. A meeting was called to consider organizing a Coast Guard Auxiliary in Edenton. Reading of books in regional library showed a big increase. July 25—A concerted revival was announced in four Baptist Churches in the county. Miss Ann Taylor was awarded a runner-up prize in the Nationwide "Sterling For Graduation" contest. Bud Parker saved a boy from drowning at the Presbyterian camp near Newport. August 1—Town Council announced a contract for extension of a water line to Westover Heights. Six Edenton firemen were honored for long periods of service, including Al Owens, Skimmer White, Tom Goodman, Frank Hughes, Willie Bunch and Clyde Adams. About 100 boys and girls participated in the first fishing rodeo held in Edenton. August 8—Due to a cut in military spending, the possibility developed that the Edenton base will be closed by the early part of 1959. Bond issue appeared likely for needed improvements in Chowan County. Roger R. Accis and George Scott purchased the tire recapping concern from Thomas Jackson on West Eden Street. August 15—A joint committee was organized to seek industry for the Albemarle area. Chowan's home demonstration clubs won second place in state for the best publicity book. August 22—About 50 boys answered call of Coach Bill Billings for football candidates. Gilliam Wood mailed out letters calling attention to the necessity of a live Chamber of Commerce. E. W. Spires pointed out need for preserving records of County's historical events. Chowan Draft Board was seeking whereabouts of 12 young men who failed to register. August 29—Chowan County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis received a check for \$3,200 from the state organization to pay outstanding polio expenses. Chowan farmers cast overwhelming majorities for "Nickels For Know How" and "Cotton Assessment" referendums. Twenty new teachers were employed for Edenton schools. Wilbur Joseph Privott, Jr., was among 89 top ranking freshmen awarded "Talent For Service" scholarships at State College. September 5—A painting of the Cupola House by Croyden Bell which appeared in "Ford Times" was presented to Edenton by Elizabeth City. Tommy Kehayes was elected chairman of high school youth of the Fourth Province of the Episcopal Church. Graham White was named chairman of the Chowan County Red Cross Chapter. September 12—Large group backed movement to support a Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Lyn Perry won a rocking chair contest at the Albemarle Furniture Company. Contract was awarded to build an auditorium at the Edenton Junior-Senior High School. Edenton Marines won general's trophies for highest scores at Cherry Point. September 19—Lieut. Col. H. A. Esela relieved Lieut. Col. R. T. Whitten as commanding officer of MAG-14 at Edenton NAAS. A & P Tea Company announced plans for a new super market in Edenton. Drive was inaugurated to secure memberships in the Chamber of Commerce. Home Feed & Fertilizer Company completed new storage bins and an elevator as the first step toward a grain market in Edenton. September 26—Tommy Kehayes, Billy Harry, Dallas Stallings and Jack Overman were promoted to Eagle Scouts. School teachers of Chowan County were guests of Edenton Rotarians. Chowan County Farm Bureau held a fish fry at Chowan High School. Chowan Home Demonstration Clubs held a very successful fashion show. October 3—Edenton Jaycees sponsored the observance of Fire Prevention Week. New visiting hours went into effect at Chowan Hospital. Plans were completed for the Chowan County Fair. West W. Byrum was elected president of the Chowan Farm Bureau. October 10—Sixteen directors were elected for the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Maurice L. Bunch was appointed register of deeds to succeed her husband, who died. Local soil conservation office was awarded certificate of merit for outstanding work in the county. October 17—Gilliam Wood was

lected president of the Chamber of Commerce. Chowan County Fair was considered a big success. Jim Stacy and Judy McLaughlin crowned king and queen at homecoming game on Hicks field. October 24—Proposed merger of the Bank of Edenton and Peoples Bank & Trust Company of Rocky Mount was announced. Seven Edenton majorettes won second place at the State Fair. Chowan Club women won honors at State Fair. Coach Bill Billings was chosen on the advisory staff for the Shrine Bowl football game in Charlotte. October 31—A helicopter found Buck Wheeler, Jr., who was lost in Bear Swamp. Edenton Woman's Club won top honors at district meeting. New car models were displayed by local automobile agencies. Four stills were captured by ATU officials. November 7—State Highway officials conferred with County Commissioners regarding county road needs. It was announced that G. H. Harding had offered an office in Hotel Joseph Hewes for the Chamber of Commerce. November 14—Edenton Aces won first round in playoffs for State Class A football championship by defeating Weldon 40-13. Edenton merchants began observance of Fall Festival of Values. Mrs. R. H. Bachman presented a valuable collection of books to the Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library. November 21—Edenton's Aces won regional honors by defeating Erwin 19-6. Bobby Belch lost his life in a tragic hunting accident. Methodist Men's Club entertained their wives at a meeting held at the church. Gene Ward left for Chicago, where he participated in a building and loan speaking contest. November 28—Edenton Aces defeated Farmville 28-18 to win the Eastern Class A football championship. Group of state officers were guests of the Edenton Chapter of the Eastern Star. Directors of the Chamber of Commerce interviewed an applicant for the position of manager. December 5—Edenton Aces defeated Mebane 14-7 to again win the State Class A football championship. Tom Ridgeway was appointed Chairman for the 1958 March of Dimes. Patricia Bunch was chosen "Good Citizen" by Edenton Tea Party Chapter, DAR. A scholarship inaugurated in memory of Bobby Belch who was killed in a hunting accident. December 12—BPW Club named Mrs. J. G. Campen as "Woman of the Year." A 500-gallon liquor still was captured between Center Hill and Cross Roads. J. A. Webb Jr., was re-elected as Chowan district supervisor. A new bookmobile was purchased for the Pettigrew Regional Library. Stockholders of the Bank of Edenton voted in favor of merger. Daniel Reaves was elected master of Unanimity Lodge No. 7, A. F. & A. M. December 19—Edenton Aces were treated to a trip to Washington to see a professional football game. Harry Smith of Old Saybrook, Conn., accepted the position as manager of the Chamber of Commerce. Music Department presented outstanding Christmas program in the Elementary School auditorium. A district March of Dimes meeting held at the Triangle Restaurant. December 26—Lieut. Thomas G. Quinlan lost his life in a plane crash near Enfield. VFW Post held a mortgage burning at a Christmas party. The Rev. Geo. Holmes was speaker at the Rotary Club's Christmas party. Chowan County went over its quota in sales of U. S. Savings Bonds.

### EXAMINE YOUR LIST BEFORE SIGNING

Report Your 1957 Crop Acreage Through Tax Lister During January, 1957

Your local Tax Lister is required to make the records but Farm Owners or Tenants must furnish the facts. Therefore, call your List Taker's attention to these records and be prepared to furnish the following information: (1) Acreage for each crop harvested during calendar year 1957. (2) Number of cows, sows, and hens on farm January, 1958. (3) Number of people living on farm January, 1958. All of the above information furnished will be considered as confidential and will not be used in any manner that is detrimental to the farmers concerned. It is not used for tax purposes.
