

Advice Given For Irrigation

Willie Joyner, who lives in the Cannon's Ferry community, is interested in an irrigation system which will be used for truck crops. Since part of Mr. Joyner's land overlooks Chowan River, he assumed that it would be cheaper to pump water from the river instead of digging a pond.

Mr. Joyner requested help with his problem and Howard M. Ellis, in charge of agricultural engineering, Extension Service specialist, visited Joyner. Ellis recommended that Joyner dig a pond to furnish water for his entire operation. Some fields are a considerable distance from the river and the high bank at the water's edge would make it very difficult to get the irrigation pump to the water, according to Ellis. He further explained that during an extremely long dry spell such as was experienced in 1937, the river water might contain too much salt to be used for irrigating plants. When the wind is blowing in the exact direction to move the water from the ocean, the salt content of water can change in a few hours according to Ellis.

If river water is used for irrigation it should be first analyzed to determine the salt content in parts per million so that a farmer will not damage his crops. Since it is highly impractical for a farmer to get an accurate analysis of the salt content of water and since the salt content can change in only a few hours, Ellis recommends that farmers use water from other sources if it is available and practical to do so.

Mr. Joyner is fortunate in that he has a good place to build an irrigation pond. This location is approximately half way between the fields which he wants to irrigate. Although there will be some expense to digging a pond in this desirable location, it should furnish an excellent source of good fresh water for irrigation purposes. Mr. Joyner is hoping to get started on his irrigation project this year if possible.

Sunday School Lesson

THE CHURCH ORGANIZES FOR SERVICE

International Sunday School Lesson for January 26, 1938.

Memory Selection: "Take heed to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you guardians, to feed the Church of the Lord which he obtained with his own blood. —Acts 20:28.

Lesson Text: Acts 6:1-7; Romans 12:3-8; Timothy 3: 5:17-22

This is the fourth lesson in a series on the church in the making and it is concerned with the organization of the church. There are two schools of thoughts, and many shades of thinking in between, on this question.

There are those who think that the church should be organized and run from above, that is by men, by humans, and there are those who believe it should be run and organized, in the name of Jesus, but by and from below. By using the word below, we refer to the democratic characteristics of the church, decisions by congregations, elections and other democratic procedures, from the ground roots, from the believers themselves, so to speak.

In Acts, chapter 1, we see that an apostle was elected to take the place of Judas Iscariot: "... One hundred and twenty persons took part in the voting." Therefore,

from the beginning, the church was not an organization run from above, by one or a few all-powerful men who were ostensibly acting in the name of God.

It is imperative in following the procedure followed by the earliest Christians of fellowship, democracy and rule from below in church organization, that some carefully-planned system be followed. The church must combine unity and variety and togetherness and individuality.

The church must bind together those who believe and yet allow them enough freedom to work for truth and work in Jesus' name to better the lot of their fellow men as best they can. But however talented its individual members are, the church must be organized efficiently or it will not accomplish what it might.

One can live a good life, so to speak, and not be very convincing to others in the living of it—and thus not contribute what he might have. A church can stand for the Christian life, and what is moral and right, but it must be organized and exert its strength and influence to be what the church of the early Christians was.

Your church may not utilize all of the individual skills and talents that are possessed by members within it. Certainly there is much leadership available that is seldom utilized in most churches. The organizers who organize
