

Farm Bureau Will Meet In Raleigh Feb. 9

Voting delegates and leaders representing more than 54,000 Farm Bureau families will gather in Raleigh on February 9-12 for the annual meeting of the North Carolina Farm Bureau to form the organization's policy and recommendations on farm problems, according to Federation President Randolph Eagles of Macesfield.

With farm income down in 1957 and the press on for lower price supports by the Eisenhower administration, interest is expected to run high, and discussions are likely to add emphasis to farmer felt need to bolster the farm economy, according to Eagles.

The Federation president urged "as many as possible" of the 54,000 members to attend. "We hope to get a large delegation from each county in addition to the voting delegates at the meeting," he declared.

"Even though there is alarm over the present farm program, Tar Heel farmers must continue to plan for the future. Economics dictate certain adjustments in our agriculture and Farm Bureau has a responsibility to assist farmers in making the adjustments in a sound manner," added Eagles.

CERTIFIED STRAWBERRIES SHOULD IMPROVE PROGRAM

Approximately 100,000 virus-free, nematode-free strawberry plants are available to North Carolina farmers for planting now, according to M. H. Kolbe, horticulture specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service.

Kolbe says that the availability of the plants is the result of a strawberry certification program started in 1956. The first of these plants from the U. S. Department of Agriculture were planted in fumigated soil in a screenhouse on the Everett Lewis farm at Rocky Point.

Plants grown in the screenhouse were then set in double fumigated soil 3,000 feet from other strawberry plants and were dusted and sprayed all during 1957.

Kolbe says that Lewis and G. L. Reynolds of Ellerbe, Route 1, are now digging and shipping these plants to North Carolina growers.

He says the improved plants should greatly improve the state's strawberry industry.

Sunday School Lesson

THE CHURCH TEACHES THE WORD

International Sunday School Lesson For February 9, 1958.

Memory Selection: "Take heed to yourself and to your teaching; hold to that, for by so doing you will save both yourself and your hearers." —I Timothy 4:16.

Lesson Text: I Timothy 4:6-16
2 Timothy 2:1-2; 3:10-17

This is the first of three lessons which will deal with Christian education, and discusses the teaching ministry of the church. The aim of the lesson is to acquaint us with the value of religious education and its proper place in our scheme of life.

All of us agree that each citizen must be aware of the question of religious education in the United States. And every member, or potential church member, is in need of religious education, regardless of the church to which he belongs, or even if he does not choose to belong to any church. (There are sixty to seventy millions of Americans who do not actively belong to a church.)

The ageless controversy, concerning religious instruction in the public schools, is not yet finally settled to the satisfaction of many churchmen to this day. It is generally agreed, however, that religious instruction in the

public schools is a tricky problem, in that no denominational slant is permissible.

That is because the U. S. Constitution declares, emphatically, that church and state shall be separated. For this reason Protestants have objected when nuns were employed to teach in some public schools and others have objected when similar instances occurred in other public schools.

The Supreme Court has already let the bar down to the extent that public money is used for church schools in the form of transportation, school lunches, textbooks and in other ways. But money cannot be further diverted to private uses, those benefitting any denomination.

The question, then, now becomes: "How are we to teach our youngsters in the field of religion. Churchmen everywhere say that a balanced education includes religious education. In fact, they say, without the Christian concepts our educational system and its effects, become sterile.

More and more private schools and colleges are being built every year, and there are denominations which believe that the ideal is to have all the members of their denomination attending church schools only—that is the members of school age. This may never come about in the United States but various
