





Merchants Study New Legislation

The Merchants Committee of the Edenton Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Thursday voted to canvass retail and service members for comments on legislation now being considered by Congress to extend provisions of the Federal Wage and Hour Law to retail and service establishments. Chairman Ralph Parrish

said the present law covers only those firms which are engaged in, or produce goods for, interstate commerce. Senate and House committees are now studying several bills which would include all retail and service businesses un

der the Federal law. Vice Chairman W. E. Malone reported on proposed uniform procedures to control solicitations and requests for advertising. He said that a draft of the procedure will be submitted to the Merchants Committee for study as soon as it is received from a committee of area Chamber of Comnerce executives. A fall sales promotion sponsor-

ed by the Merchants Committee in October was favorably discussed and Chairman Parrish said he


