To the visiting guests, both military and civilian, who have come to view this ceremony I would like to extend the welcome of our communities and our pledge of cooperation and full support of this undertaking, both in the construction phase and upon commissioning of this vital defense installation. The State of North Carolina has a reputation for hospitality and good neighborliness which is unsurpassed anywhere in the country, and the citizens of this area look forward eagerly to the day when we shall greet the military personnel arriving to man this station and assist

them in settling down for what we know will be gratifying tours of duty in our communities.

"At the outset today I wish to touch upon the extreme importance of this activity in the defense of this great and powerful nation. As you may know, it is being constructed for the support of one of the newest and most far reaching additions to the Navy's air arm, the Martin P6M SeaMaster. These aircraft and the men who will operate them will make up the latest innovation in the concept of mobile striking forces. Their contribution to the National Defense will be immeasurable. We may all be proud that the Navy has selected our area for the location of the first base of this kind and entrusted us with its perpetual keeping.

"To impress all present with the magnitude of this project I would like to quote several figures associated with the construction and operation of this station. The Navy will spend approximately 45 million dollars on construction of these facilities. Some 60% or 27 million dollars will be expended in this area for labor and materials. When this base is completed it will support some 2,487 military personnel and employ about 194 civilians. Annual expenditures for maintenance and operations will amount to about 1.5 million dollars including civilian payrolls. The annual military payroll will approximate 9 million dollars. It goes without saying

that these dollars will flow into the economy of our state, making possible extensive development which would not otherwise be possible. We must stand ready to receive this economic stimulus with progressive ideas and the willingness to invest our labors in transmitting them into action which will benefit both the Navy and our community.

"The military personnel who will make their homes with us will have problems which only we can solve. They, with their dependents, will look to us for support in their religious, educational, and social lives, as well as their economic needs. We in turn will look to them for support of our community endeavors. Through such mutual cooperation and support our country and our community cannot but profit from this great undertaking.

"Upon this note I will close my address today and here and now call upon every citizen in this area to join me in pledging to the Navy our wholehearted welcome."

Rear Admiral F. Massie Hughes, commander of naval air bases in the Fifth Naval District, another speaker, said he was delighted over the return of the Navy to Harvey Point, pointing out the pleasant relations existing when the base was previously in operation.

"This is the beginning of a big adventure," said the Admiral. "Many problems will face us before the day the base is finally

completed, but I'm sure we'll come out of it with a development for which we all can be justly proud."

Both speakers referred to the inadequacy of roads leading to the base and urged people in this area to plead with the powers that be to lose no time in constructing "highways" which will take care of the traffic to and from the base. The base will be the home of the Martin P6M SeaMaster jet seaplanes.

A group of dignitaries, occupied the speakers' stand, including Mayor Ernest Kehayes of Edenton, Mayor V. N. Darden of Hertford and Mayor Levin Culpepper of Elizabeth City. Representatives of the Martin Company presented each mayor with a miniature model of the plane which will be based at Harvey Point.

Congressman Bonner and Rear Admiral Hughes manipulated the shovels in covering with dirt the holes into which the supports of a large sign was placed.

Following the ceremony at the base the Town of Hertford and Perquimans County officials were hosts at a sumptuous dinner

served at Hotel Hertford for a large group of specially invited guests, after which the distinguished guests returned to Edenton to board a plane for their return home.
