Senator B. Everett Jordan Urges Navy To Reconsider Deactivating Edenton Base

Advantages For Military Operations and **Training Pointed Out** To Navy Officials

Senator B. Everett Jordan (D-N.C.), asked Secretary of Navy Thomas S. Gates, Jr., to reconsider the Navy's decision to close the Naval Auxiliary Air Station here next March. The Senator's action followed receipt of a letter from the Chamber of Commerce which points out the many advantages of the Edenton base in view of the problem of air collisions between military and commercial aircraft. The base is ideally located in an area away from commercial air lanes with plenty of air room for military operations and training.

In his letter to Secretary Gates, Senator Jordan said the Chamber "sets forth sound arguments for reconsideration, in view of the current nation-wide concern over the dangerously congested conditions in our airways in many parts of the country. The Edenton base has obvious advantages in this respect, and it is an increasingly important one. I hope very much that you will see to it given the weight it deserves as


