## **Big Production At Planetarium** During Summer

The biggest production ever attempted by any planetarium in any program is being presented at the Morehead Planetarium at Chapel Hill this summer.

Eleven months of planning went into "Land, Sea and Sky" to make it both entertaining and enlightening.

Thus, it has become a thrilling up-to-the-minute report of the discoveries of 10,000 scientists in 66 nations during this International Geophysical Year.

It's the biggest thing ever attempted and all North Carolina will be proud of it. It's a program for every member of the family of whatever age. In the past was presented a space trip show during July, August and September. This year there are three trip shows in one, plus new panorama, lighting and sound effects which differ from anything yet offered.

In it the new discoveries about the land, the oceans and the heavens and the trends they indicate are incorporated in three exciting and colorful phases of the program-an overnight flight to the Antartic, a depth dive thousands of fathoms into the sea and a zoom trip to the moon.

Researchers, and writers, artists and technicians conferred and selected the most important discoveries which could be graphically presented to the public, both entertainingly and educationally. Among those they chose are ice tunnels 90 feet deep in the Antarctic, life on the bottom of the ocean and sounds that fishes make 2,000 fathoms down and satellite launchings.

The program will be given daily at 3 and 8:30 P. M., on Saturdays at 11 A. M., 3, 4 and 8:30 P. M., and on Sundays at 2, 3, 4, and 8:30 P. M.


