"And this is only the beginninng," Orr said. "By this time next year we hope to have 500 certified tree farmers in the state.

"We are in a good position for advances under the program-North Carolina is second only to Texas in number of small farms.' Most of them, he said, have woodlands which could be eligible for certification.
