The principal speaker for the occasion was Commander Hutchinson, who said he just wanted to chat. He said the Legion was going ahead with progress made in membership. He expressed regret that John A. Holmes, who introduced him, had not been elected as department commander.

"We gave them 110 miles more than was agreed upon," he said, "we should call their bluff, make them stay put or go back to the battle line when the war ended." He said he hoped there will not be a war, but if we do the forces of righteousness will not quit.

Mr. Green spoke about the Back-to-God movement and said Russia was trying to destroy everything we stand for, and urged Legionnaires and Auxiliary members to attend the church of their choice.

Mrs. Martin gave a treatise on Americanism, saying we should be alerted in Americanism and that there is a need to inspire and impress upon young people that they will be the citizens of tomorrow.

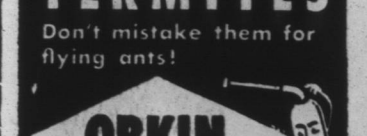
