Modern Money Manners:
"No family budget is ever really successful unless everybody in the family agrees that it is a good budget," said Mrs. Evelyn Watson, home economics agent in Burke County at recent Home Demonstration Club meetings.

Mrs. J. P. Hatley said that she thought she was a good money manager until she heard the discussion where she received information that would make her job as "money manager" easier.

Sewing Techniques
Mrs. Dallas Sears of Wake County recently made a suit which cost only \$15; it would have compared favorably with a \$65 suit she might have purchased.

According to Mrs. Myrtle Swicegood, home economics agent, many county Home Demonstration Club women have exhibited improvements in hand-made garments. Improved belts, belt carriers, zippers, interfacing, and sleeves have been noticed. Good sewing techniques give garments the hand-made look, not the home-made look.

Glamorized Beans
One groceryman in Randolph County wondered why there was a sudden rush on dried beans. Later, he found that there had been a demonstration in the county on "Cooking Dried Beans and Peas."

Miss Rose Badgett, home economics agent, says that the Home Demonstration Club women were delighted with the dishes prepared using dried beans and were calling for additional recipe leaflets. Mrs. Hal Luther said she never knew dried beans tasted so good. Economy in using dried beans in the menu was emphasized.

Fabric Finishes
"More than just fiber goes in-

to making cloth," said Mrs. Thelma McCotter, home economics agent in Pamlico County. New finishes are important to consider when buying material.

Such fabric finishes as "wash and wear," "minimum care," "moth" and "water-repellant," "wrinkle resistant," and "hygienic," were discussed.

The club women were urged to study the various finishes and labels when buying material. Always study the label because it tells about the "fabric's hidden service."

Buying Meats
"What do you know about buying meat?" According to Mrs. Emily Johnson, home economics agent, the Home Demonstration Club women in Pender County now realize the variety of meat that is available.

There was a study of the various animal types, grades, cuts and prices. Preparation of meats was emphasized. Dry heat, moist heat, and fat cooking were discussed as methods of preparation. It was pointed out that cheaper cuts are nutritious and good if prepared correctly.

Garden Month
Garden Month has recently been observed in Watauga County according to Miss Jean Childers, home economics agent.

Home Demonstration Club member, Mrs. R. H. Harmon, was chairman of the event. Booklets were mimeographed in quantity for distribution in stores that sell seed and garden supplies, as well as at meetings throughout the county.

People throughout Watauga County were urged to plant varieties recommended for conserving—thus supplementing the grocery budget.
