### N. C. Ranks 38th In Teachers' Pay

North Carolina's classroom teachers are receiving this year an average salary of \$3,770 and thus ranks 38th among the 49 states in this respect.

This is reported recently in its fall estimates by the Research Division of the National Education Association, Alaska,

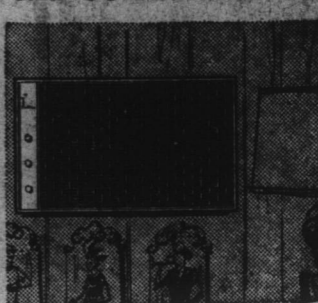
the newest state, ranks first in this respect with an average to these NEA estimates, is Mississippi with an average of \$3,070.

Other states ranking below North Carolina are the following: Georgia, \$3,625; West Virginia, \$3,610; Nebraska, \$3,525; Tennessee, \$3,475; North Dakota, \$3,450; South Dakota, \$3,400; Alabama, \$3,350; South Carolina, \$3,305; Arkansas, \$3,270; and Kentucky, \$3,250.

Some of the states with high-

er average salaries than North Carolina in addition to Alaska are the following: New York, \$6,200 (2); Maryland, \$5,300 (6); Florida, \$4,980 (16); Louisiana, \$4,560 (23); Oklahoma, \$4,500 (26); Texas, \$4,410 (27) and Virginia, \$3,900 (36).

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
