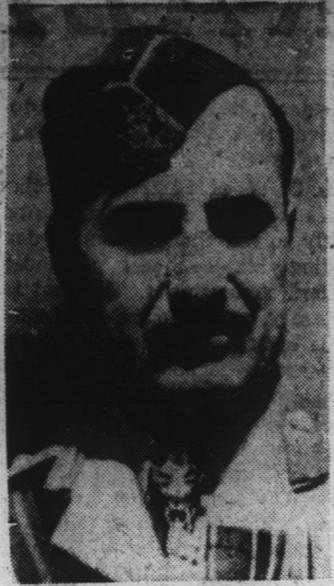

FEWER WATERMELONS PLANTED FOR YEAR

Latest reports from producers indicate that about 13,500 acres of watermelons are planted for harvest in North Carolina during 1959. This amounts to a 10 per cent reduction from the estimated 15,000 acres harvested in 1958. This year's production is forecast to yield 810,000 cwt. with a 60 cwt. yield per acre. The same yield was estimated for 1958 with a production of 900,000 cwt.



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Sunday School Lesson

NATIONS NEED RELIGIOUS LEADERS

International Sunday School Lesson for June 28, 1959.

Memory Selection: "The lips of a priest should guard knowledge, and men should seek instruction from his mouth, for he is the messenger of the Lord of hosts." —(Malachi 2:7).

Lesson Text: 2 Kings 11 and 12

This lesson shows the function of religion in a community and nation and emphasizes the importance of capable and devoted religious leaders.

In America we believe in the principal of the separation of church and state. Misinterpretation of this principle sometimes leads us into difficulty. It is important that we understand the ideal relationship between church and state. The main question, of this lesson, therefore, is: What part does religion have to play in the life of a nation?

In many areas the principle of separation of church and state is being interpreted to mean separation of religion from education and civic affairs. This is something the founding fathers never intended. The founding fathers believed that there should never be control of our government by any church and that the church shall be free from any political control. But we Americans also believe that the blessings of religion should be available to every person or group in political leadership.

ership. That is why our government authorizes the appointment of chaplains to House and Senate. We believe that our government should be operated according to the finest standards known to us through religious conviction. Thus, we believe that it is a responsibility of religious leaders to aid people in evaluating proposed legislation against the dictates of their consciences. And it is because of events similar to the one in our Bible story today that we in America believe in separation of church and state.

During the time that the young prince Jehoash and his nurse were in hiding, there was ample opportunity for him to be trained by the priests. Apparently the instruction received by Jehoash made him a loyal supporter of the priesthood and of prophetic religion. The record states that "Jehoash did what was right in the eyes of the Lord all his days, because Jehoash the priest instructed him." (2 Kings 12:2). Jehoash had a mind of his own, however, and did what he thought was right. He was instrumental in repairing the temple, and in taking over the administration of money matters where his priests proved themselves inadequate.

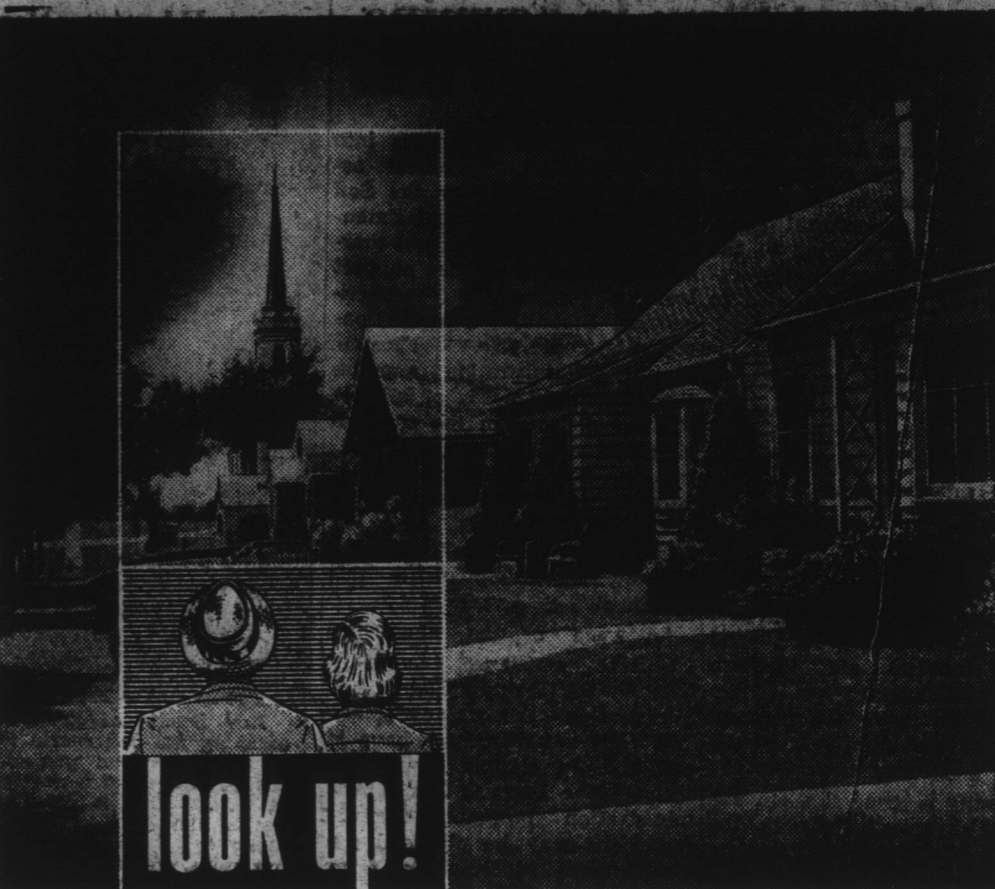
It is apparent from the story of Jehoash the priest and King Jehoash that the power of religion was greater because each made his particular contribution. Today leadership in religion is not confined by any means to professional workers. We have
