Minutes Of County Board Of Education

July 6, 1959 The regular meeting of the County Board of Education was held July 3, 1959, at 10:00 A. M., in the superintendent's office with the following members present: Mrs. Mary D. Nixon, chairman, Sherlon Layton, Marvin Evans, Eugene Jordan, Mrs. F. A. Ward and Garland Asbell.

The chairman called the meeting to order with prayer by Eugene Jordan. The secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting and upon motion made by Mr. Jordan, and seconded by Mr. Asbell, the minutes were unanimously approved.

The reports of the Local School Fund treasurer along with the County Treasurer's report were presented and adopted by a motion made by Mr. Evans and seconded by Mr. Jordan.

The bills payable for the month of June were read by the secretary and same were adopted by a motion made by Mr. Evans and seconded by Mr. Asbell.

A motion was made by Mr. Asbell and seconded by Mr. Layton and unanimously adopted that White Oak Consolidated School open August 17, and that Chowan High School open August 31. One day would be allowed for the NCEA meeting dates, two days for Thanksgiving, Christmas holidays from December 18 to January 4 and Easter Monday. The 1959-60 school term would end May 26, if no time was lost.

It was the unanimous opinion that teachers should be paid after each 20 day teaching period, rather than on a stated date in the calendar month.

The Board voted to affiliate with the North Carolina School Board Association by authorization of the payment of the fee. The following contracts were approved with George K. Gelbach to teach History and English at Chowan High School, and with Robert D. Clark to teach English and French at Chowan High School.

The superintendent was requested to have the veterans training program instructor's June report checked for accuracy.

The superintendent was instructed to prepare certain instructions to principals and teachers, pertaining to students driving cars to school, teacher-ent, school buses stopping at stores on route to school and home, time at which principals and teachers should be at school, adopting a system of periodic attendance checking during the school day, etc.

The Board adjourned, with the superintendent stating that his office would be closed July 26 to August 3, for a week's vacation, and from August 10-14 in attendance at the Annual State Superintendents' Conference in Mars Hill, N. C.
