This property is to be advertised for 30 days and sold November 14, 1959, at 12 o'clock noon at the Court House door. The county will reserve the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

On motion of J. R. Peele, seconded by C. J. Hollowell and duly carried that the delinquent taxes from September 15, 1949 to September 15, 1959 in the amount of \$67,397.61 as confirmed by audit be charged to the Sheriff and the Sheriff is authorized to collect same.

On motion of J. R. Peele, seconded by C. J. Hollowell and duly carried that Sheriff Earl Goodwin be allowed as collector of delinquent taxes a commission of 20% on personal property taxes and 15% on real and personal taxes combined. The percentage scale is to be retroactive to the time at which Sheriff Goodwin was made delinquent tax collector. March 2, 1959. Taxes will not be considered delinquent until one year following the date the levy is set, which is July. Therefore the motion made at the August 3rd meeting was rescinded.
