Miss Mary Hadley Fike and Dr. Lloyd Eldon Griffin, Jr., were married Saturday evening at 8 o'clock in the First Methodist at Wilson with the Rev. R. Grady Dawson officiating.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Ralph Llewellyn Fike and the late Dr. Fike and Dr. Griffin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Griffin of Edenton and Raleigh.

Cathedral candles lighted the choir loft which was banked with palms and calla lilies.

Prior to the ceremony a program of nuptial music was presented by Mrs. Charles Davenport, organist, and Gene Barnes, soloist. The traditional wedding marches were used.

The bride entered the church with her uncle, Thomas Hadley Woodard, by whom she was given in marriage. She wore a gown of frosted duchess satin fashioned with portrait neck line, molded bodice and long fitted sleeves. The voluminous skirt was made with a peplum and extended into a court train. Scrolled appliques of pearl paillettes set in French ribbon bordered the neck line and peplum. Her full length veil was of Brussels lace and her bouquet was of cascading lilies of the valley, bride roses and stephanotis centered with a white orchid and containing a sprig of oleander traditional in the bride's family. The oleander was taken from rootings of the original bouquet of white oleander carried by the bride's grandmother, the late Mrs. Walter F. Woodard, on her wedding day.

expressed high hopes that Edenton will obtain another good and sizeable industry in the near future. "With local people working so hard," said Mr. Smith, "it is bound to pay off. Bread spread upon the water will come back eventually."

Mr. Smith has been executive vice president of the Chamber of Commerce for about 2½ years. He began his work locally in January, 1958, and has done a splendid job in guiding the work so that Edenton's Chamber of Commerce is now the best it has ever experienced. In accepting his resignation, President Jones said Mr. Smith's departure will be a distinct loss to the Chamber of Commerce and the entire community. Committee On Aging Planning To Meet Problems In Chowan

The Chowan County Aging Committee of the Governor's Coordinating Committee on Aging met Thursday, April 21, at St. Paul's Parish House. The purpose of the group is to determine what the problems are in Chowan County and to attempt to find solutions to any unmet needs which exist. The general consensus of opinion of members is that the greatest need is economic, for there is a lack of employment for older citizens as well as for many younger ones. Many people would like to supplement their income from Social Security, disability and other means of support.

The committee plans to start various classes which may enable those attending to be able to earn more money. These plans are in the formative stage at present and help is sorely needed as to suggestions, volunteer teachers and would-be students. Recreational classes and groups will also be organized as demands present themselves.

In the fall Fred Drane will definitely work with any people who are interested in learning how to repair broken or damaged furniture. Classes will be held in the old kitchen at his home on Water Street and Colonial Court.

Next month W. D. Fuller will start a discussion group in some phase of literature or some current topic, the subject to be decided by the group. Announcements will be made in The Chowan Herald and over radio station WCDJ very soon. The group will probably be organized the second week in May. Mr. Fuller would like to hear from any interested persons.

Other suggestions set forth by committee members were: A camera club; a chess club; a bird watchers' club; croquet; a choral group; an art class; a class in sewing. Any other suggestions will be welcomed.

Any classes or groups will be open to people of all ages. The committee does not feel that they should be limited to older citizens exclusively. There is no financial aid available, in fact the committee has no funds with which to work. It wishes to give any assistance needed to senior citizens other than financial. Any unmet needs within the scope of the committee should be brought to its attention. The lack of a nursing home or of a home for older people in Chowan County has been discussed but no decision as to whether there should be one can be reached at this point. Expressions of opinion will be welcomed on this important matter.


Norma Blanchard of John A. Holmes High represented Chowan County in the advanced division. This division did not win any honors in the district contest.


