

## KNOW YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

John T. Grooms, representative of the Social Security Administration, is in Edenton every Thursday at the North Carolina Employment Security Commission office in the Citizens Bank Building.

Social security amendments signed by the President on September 12, 1960, will bring benefits to an estimated 125,000 additional disabled workers and to the members of their families throughout the country, John T. Grooms, Field Representative of the Social Security Office serving this area, announced today.

The change regarding disability benefits is only one of a number of changes made by the amendments. The new law will bring increased benefits to 400,000 children and, through liberalized work requirements, will make some 250,000 people age 6 or over eligible for benefits. Other significant provisions increase the number of people eligible for benefits and increase benefits in some instances.

Returning to disability insurance, a person can now qualify for disability benefits without

his family may draw the benefits even if he has not reached 50—the age requirement in the prior law.

Those who have already made application to have their social security records frozen because of their disability do not need to take any action now. The Social Security Administration has their records on file and will write to them telling them what they should do. However, those disabled people who have not had a previous contact with a social security office to discuss disability protection should get in touch with our office right away because benefits cannot be paid until an application for them is made.

## Farmers, Co-ops Set New Mark In Loans From Credit System

Farmers and their cooperatives, made record use of their Farm Credit System loan facilities during the fiscal year ended June 30.

According to R. B. Tootell, Governor, Farm Credit Administration, the independent agency which supervises the credit system nationally, farmers and their purchasing and marketing cooperatives borrowed nearly \$4 billion during the year, while their loans outstanding reached a new high of \$4.8 billion.

Tootell attributed much of the continued rise in use of credit by farmers to their efforts to improve efficiency through substituting capital for labor.

Much of the increased use of credit, it was pointed out, was accounted for through the 494 production credit associations where farmers last year borrowed \$2.6 billion—an increase of 5.8 per cent—to pay operating expenses and to make purchases of equipment, machinery and other capital items.

The 13 banks for cooperatives make facility, working capital and commodity loans. Over 2,000 farmers' purchasing, marketing and business service cooperatives borrowed \$672 million from the 13 banks for cooperatives during the year—a 5.6 per cent increase in amount over a year ago.

Although the total of farmers' new long-term mortgage loans from the Federal land banks amounted to 10 per cent less

than during the previous year, Tootell said, the amount of loans farmers had outstanding hit a new peak of \$2.5 billion at the year's end.

Loanable funds for the system are obtained through the sale of bonds and debentures to the public. Sales of such securities during the year totaled \$3.8 billion. These securities are not guaranteed by the Government in any way.

Combined net worth of the banks and associations of the system increased by \$58 million during the year to over \$1.2 billion, Tootell reported.


