The Aces have an enviable record thus far, having won all five of the games played. They have rolled up a total of 168 points, which could have been even larger if so desired. At the same time the Aces have held their opponents to 12 points. To date the Aces have bowled over Camden, Roanoke Rapids, Wallace-Rose Hill, Williamston and Scotland Neck, with five touchdowns scored in four of the games and six in another.

On the other hand, the Yellow Jackets have a less impressive record. They have won only one game out of four, having won over Washington and losing to Hertford, Tarboro and Roanoke Rapids.

In a rivalry which began in

1926, the Yellow Jackets hold a handy lead in victories. During that time they have been the victors in 26 of the 32 games played. The Aces won only in 1934, 1935, 1937, 1948, 1949 and not then again until 1959.

Coach Honey Johnson and his Yellow Jackets have not forgotten their drubbing at the hands of the Aces last year, when the Aces won 33-0. They will be out for revenge, so that anything might happen in a game that will be the highlight in the Albemarle section Friday night.

The Aces are in good shape physically and are practicing hard this week in anticipation of one of their toughest battles of the season.

The Edenton Band will join the crack Elizabeth City Band in providing entertainment for the fans and adding color to this annual event. Barring unfavorable weather, a large crowd of Edenton supporters will accompany the Aces to Elizabeth City.


