## All Incumbents Returned To Office By Edenton Voters In Election Held Tuesday

Richard D. Dixon, Jr., Newcomer on Board To Succeed William C. Bunch, Jr., From First Ward

With 21 candidates seeking the 13 offices in the Edenton municipal election Tuesday of this week, all of the incumbents were returned to office for another two-year term. The only change in the new administration will be the addition of Richard Dixon, Jr., who won out S Councilman from the First Ward. Dixon will succeed W. C. Bunch, Jr., who recently regned after moving his resince to Norfolk.

Contrary to previous elections there were quite a few write-in ballots cast.

Mayor John Mitchener won by landslide over L. H. Haskett, a former Mayor by better than a 2-to-1 vote. Mitchener polled 803 votes to 355 by Haskett, and carried substantial majorities in all four wards.
