Farm And Home Accidents

Cost Lives: Fifty-nine residents of North Carolina lost their lives in home and farm accidents in the month of May, 1961, according to information released by the Public Health Statistics Section of the North Carolina State Board of Health. During the same month, motor vehicle accidents caused 105 deaths; all other accidents accounted for 39 deaths.

For the first 5 months of 1961 (January through May), all accidents have caused 1,051 deaths as compared with 1,047 deaths during the corresponding period in 1960. A breakdown of the five-month 1961 accidental death toll reveals that motor vehicle accidents caused 475 deaths; home and farm accidents, 374 deaths; all other accidents (occupational, non-motor vehicle transport, public place, etc.), 202 deaths.

Poison bugs but not yourself or your children. Homeowners battling the bugs will spend several hundred million dollars this year to stack shelves with a variety of powerful poisons bearing such strange laboratory-sounding names as dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane. These chemicals have been carefully connected to knock a fly out of mid-air or shrivel crab grass overnight. Although some crab grass is rather stubborn and some flies remarkably resistant, no one doubts the killing quality of pesticides. However, few users of these deadly compounds realize that what poisons the bugs can also poison people.

Some of the everyday names of these chemicals are DDT, Parathion, Korlan, Methoxyachlor, Malathion, Toxaphene, Aldrin, Endrin, Trithion and Ethion. There are others but these are the principal ones being used in our area. Each package contains instructions for use and also cautions on how to use and when to use. Read these instructions carefully and completely and respect these chemicals as being detrimental to humans. They are wonderful chemicals when used as prescrib-

ed and we have to use them to control insects but there is no need of the user or children being injured or killed by these insecticides if instructions are carefully followed on their use and they are properly labeled and stored where children can't get them and where they won't be accidentally misused.

Symptoms may be no more than dermatitis, slight dizziness, or a headache with quick recovery. On the other hand, there could be loss of energy or a lingering case of neuritis or incurable anemia. Worst of all, there could be sudden convulsions and coma leading to death.

Do You Have A Good Fall Garden Started? We have ample moisture in the soil now to get our seed off to a good start providing we have an occasional shower to keep them going. Some of the crops which may be planted right now are snapbeans, beets, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, collards, carrots, kale, turnips, squash and cucumbers. There may be others that will mature before a heavy frost comes.

Prepare the soil well and apply about one quart of 8-8-8 fertilizer to each 100 feet of row. Sidedress leafy crops with nitrogen at the rate of one teacup full of nitrate of soda, A.N.L. or Cal-Nitro, when the plants are about six inches tall. Cultivate shallow and frequently enough to control grass and weeds. Use recommended insecticides for controlling insects, just remember that this time of the year the insect population has built up and can do lots of damage very quickly. 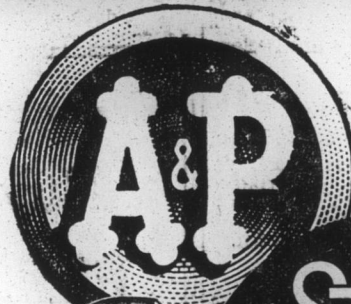
