

KNOW YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

John T. Grooms, representative of the Social Security Administration, is in Edenton every Thursday at the North Carolina Employment Security Commission office in the Citizens Bank Building.

In general, a wage earner gets credit for one quarter under Social Security for each quarter in which he has been paid cash wages of at least \$50. This work can have been done at any time after 1936. A self-employed individual receives credit for all four quarters in the year if his net earnings from business amount to \$400 or more. General self-employment was placed under the Social Security law beginning in 1951.

The amount of credits one needs to be fully insured depends upon the year he reaches 65 (62 for a woman). Under the new law, this is credit for one-fourth of the quarters elapsing between January 1951 and January of the year in which one reaches 65 or 62.

Most employers recognize the importance of keeping accurate records of employees earnings and the amount of Social Security taxes they withhold. They also realize that quarterly reports must be filed with the Director of Internal Revenue at the end of each calendar quarter. Some employers of domestic or farm workers are, however, still unaware of their record-keeping and reporting responsibilities. Domestic work

must be reported when a worker is paid \$50 or more in cash by the same employer in a calendar quarter. A farm worker's earnings must be reported when one employer pays him \$150 or more in cash in a year. These wages must also be reported if he works as many as twenty days during the year for the same employer for cash wages computed on a time basis.

The Social Security Administration recommends that a person check his or her Social Security record every three years to make sure that all earnings are being properly credited. You can do this by obtaining from your local Social Security Office Form OAR-7004, a self-addressed postcard especially designed for this purpose. Get this card today by a visit, telephone call, or letter. Complete all items on the card and mail it. In a short time you will receive a record of all earnings which have been posted to your Social Security account. If you do not believe the record is correct, take the card and some proof of your earnings back to your Social Security office. Personnel there will help you get corrections made.

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Mr. Conger also apprised the stockholders that approximately \$6,000 in notes pledging to buy a like amount of corporation stock were outstanding for a considerable time despite efforts to collect the notes due. Subsequently the following officers of the corporation were chosen: J. R. DuLaney, president; W. J. P. Earnhardt, vice president, and Graham White, secretary-treasurer. Officers will serve for the next fiscal year. The Edenton Development Corporation was chartered in 1954 and its officers and directors took the lead in industrial development and community betterment programs, acting as a Chamber of Commerce. Since the reorganization of the Edenton Chamber of Commerce in 1958, the Edenton Development Corporation concerned its activities primarily to the development of the Edenton Industrial Park where it presently owns 42 acres with all utilities available and with a state-maintained, access road. The location is ideal for its purpose being bounded by the Norfolk Southern Railway on one side and U. S. Highway 17 on the other.

It is an invaluable asset for the development of this immediate area and is eligible upon application for development loans from the Small Business Administration in Washington to assist in building new plant facilities for prospective industry.

Retiring officers of the Edenton Development Corporation are J. H. Conger, Jr., president, and Mayor John A. Mitchener, Jr., secretary-treasurer.

The court appointed J. M. Thord as foreman. Judge Mintz briefly charged the Grand Jury during which he explained the duties of the

body, pointing out that a Grand Jury is called upon to serve one of the highest duties of the state. He said a Grand Jury is a group of citizens selected to enforce the laws of the state and community impartially and without fear or favor. It is a means of prosecuting those guilty and also of preventing false accusations and persecuting of the innocent.

Cases disposed of Tuesday were: Willie B. Twine, who was tried and sentenced in 1954, was ordered to report to court Wednesday.

John Willie Williams, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to 21 months. Clarence Privott, charged with larceny, entered a plea of guilty. He was ordered to remain in custody to testify for the state in other cases pending. He was placed under \$200 bond.

Kelly Springfield White, charged with larceny, entered a plea of guilty and was also ordered held in custody to testify for the state. Charlie Scott Mooring, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, was found guilty and sentenced to 18 months.

Charles Edward Silverthorne, charged with forgery, entered a plea of guilty and received a sentence of 18 months. Frederick Lee Gilliam, charged with probation violation, was ordered arrested and a capias issued.

Herbert Brownridge, on three counts of forgery, was sentenced to not less than five years and not more than eight years. Luther Hardy, charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, was sentenced to seven to nine years. Dora Ward, charged with forgery, was found not guilty.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$643,000 OF BONDS OF THE TOWN OF EDENTON FOR THE ENLARGEMENT AND EXTENSION OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM OF THE TOWN OF EDENTON.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Councilmen of the Town of Edenton, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Councilmen of the Town of Edenton has ascertained and hereby determines that it is necessary that said Town enlarge and extend the sanitary sewer system maintained and operated by said Town, by constructing a new sewage disposal plant and interceptor sewers, pumping stations, sewer mains and other facilities needed to connect such plant with such sanitary sewer system and by acquiring the lands or rights in land and equipment needed therefor, and that it will be necessary to expend for said purpose not less than \$643,000.

Section 2. Said Board of Councilmen has also ascertained and hereby determines that the purpose hereinbefore described is a necessary expense of said Town within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina, and is a purpose for which said Town

may raise or appropriate money, and is not a current expense of said Town.

Section 3. In order to raise the money required for such purpose, bonds of the Town of Edenton are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina. The maximum aggregate amount of bonds authorized by this ordinance shall be Five Hundred Forty-three Thousand Dollars (\$543,000).

Section 4. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 5. A statement of the debt of said Town has been filed with the Town Clerk of said Town, as required by said Act, and is open to public inspection.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of said Town at an election to be called and held as provided in said Act.

The foregoing bond ordinance was passed on the 12th day of September, 1961, and was first published on the 14th day of September, 1961.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication. W. B. GARDNER, Town Clerk of the Town of Edenton, N. C. Sept 14, 21c
