Louis George Wilkins and Charles P. Wales, Jr., University of North Carolina graduates, received orders to report for naval reserve training, Wilkins to Northwestern University at Chicago and Wales to Prairie State, New York City.

Hector Lupton was re-appointed as a member of the Chowan ABC Board for a three year term.

According to recent action taken by the Daughters of the American Revolution, plans were announced to restore the Eden-

ton Tea Party house in a bad state of repair, to its original likeness and remove it to a suitable location. Judge Richard D. Dixon said the work will be done in the near future and that it will provide another historic landmark for Edenton as an attraction for visitors.

Chowan's Sales Tax Collections Increase

Sales tax collected in Chowan County during June, 1961, were greater than the previous month as well as June, 1960. According to "The Retailer," published monthly by the North Carolina Merchants Association, sales tax collections in June of this year were \$12,955.05, compared with \$11,773.43 in May and \$11,711.53 in June, 1960.

The report also shows that gross retail sales were correspondingly higher. Sales in June 1961 amounted to \$1,338,607, compared with 1,258,168 in May and \$1,235,732 in June, 1960.
