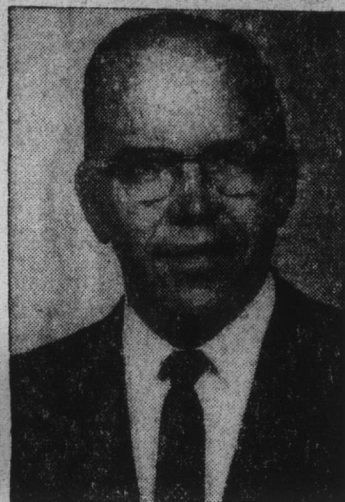
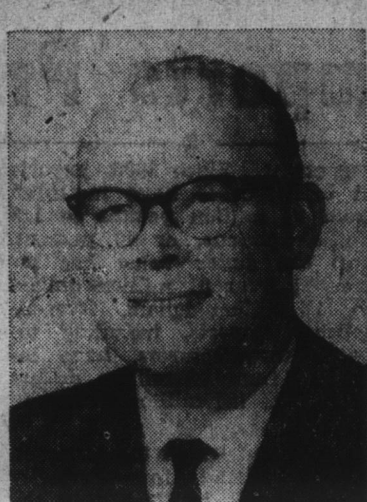


PRINCIPALS IN ROCKY HOCK WEEK OF REVIVAL AND MISSIONS

Dear Jessica

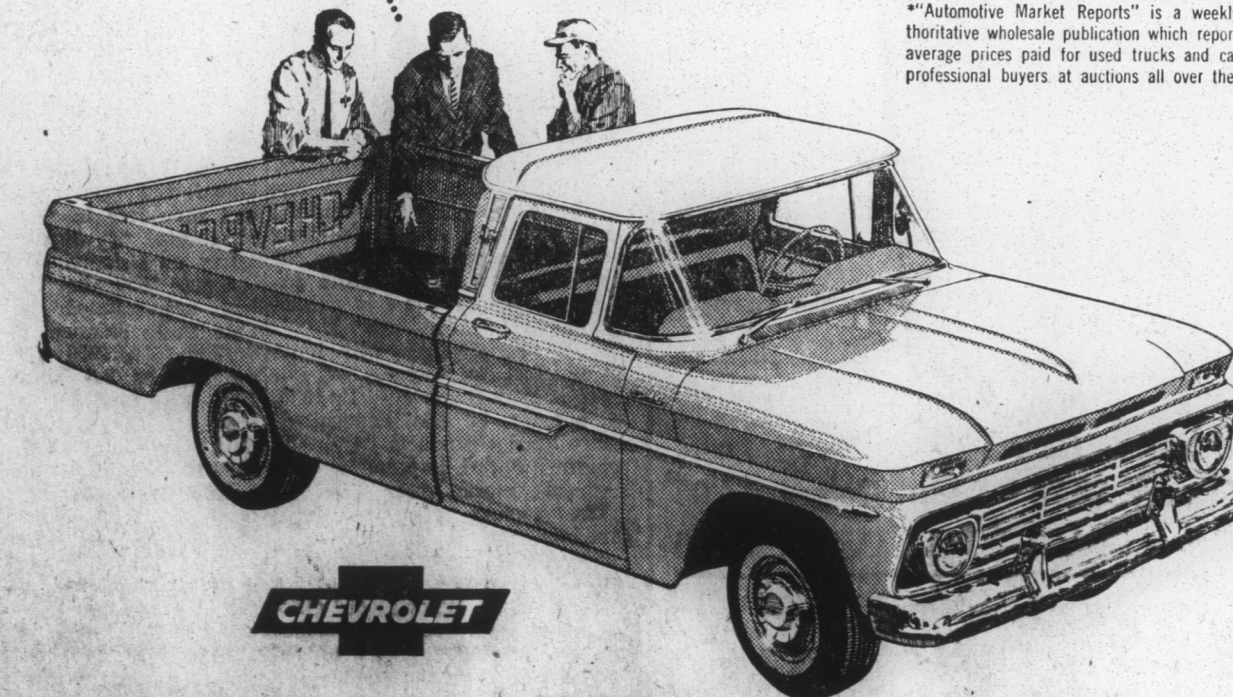
