Edenton Jaycees plan to sell safety seat belts to car owners in Edenton, according to Bill Easterling, president. The belts will go on sale today (Thursday).

The belts are available in a variety of colors to match automobile interiors. They have been approved by various testing services and the Department of Motor Vehicles. The Jaycees will realize no profit from the sale of belts.

Chairman of the overall project is Britton Byrum.

Price of belts are \$4.00 and will be installed for \$1.50 per person under normal installation and will be installed at the following places: Albemarle Motor Co., Colonial Motor Co., Edenton Motor Co., and George Chevrolet Co.
