

### SENATOR Sam Ervin SAYS

Washington — A study just released by the Tobacco Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has important implications for North Carolina and U. S. tobacco growers. According to the March 1962 study the new external duty rate on unmanufactured U. S. tobacco levied by the European Common Market has been increased by one-third over the 1958 rate. This is a 28 percent ad valorem rate with a maximum effective rate of 17.2 cents per pound and a minimum of 13.2 cents per pound. The report states: "The rate is itself is higher than the 1958 rate and contains a bias in favor of lower priced tobaccos which was not in the specific duties of individual (EEC) member countries. The old specific rates ranged from zero in France and Italy to 19.3 cents per pound in Germany. The average incidence in 1958 on tobacco from the U. S. was equivalent to 19.3 percent ad valorem compared with about 25.8 percent under the new rate. Tobacco from member countries will have duty-free access to other member countries. Tobaccos from the associated areas of Greece and Africa will also enter duty-free into all Common Market countries. . . . Europe has been a market for U. S. tobacco for about 350 years. Flue-cured tobacco is by far the most important U. S. export. The United States exports about 100 million pounds of flue-cured annually to the 'Six' (Germany, Netherlands, Belgium - Luxembourg, France, Italy)." The crux of the problem can be summed up with the fact that under the new tariff imposed by the European Common Market, U. S. tobacco will face a duty considerably higher than it did in 1958, and tobacco from EEC member countries and associates (Greece and African areas) will have no duty to pay. The study concludes that "unless the United States is successful in negotiating further reductions (in EEC tariff), it is likely to experience a decreasing share of an increasing (tobacco) market."

Mrs. Bessie Jernigan and Mrs. Norman Bulls went to Newport News Sunday.

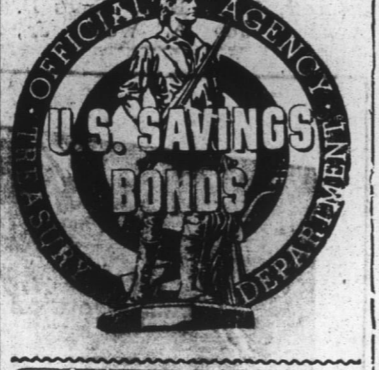

among some, to poke fun at "do-gooders," but the New Testament, while repudiating the doctrine of good works as the door to salvation, nevertheless encourages the saved sinner to do good.

The word "regeneration" denotes the decisive spiritual change effected by God's Holy Spirit in which a soul, naturally estranged from God, is renewed in disposition, substitutes holy affections and desires for selfish gratification, and enters upon a life of increasing holiness, thus growing more like Christ.

This is Palm Sunday. Today we are thinking about Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem as the Messiah. But we must also realize that only a few days after the crowds hailed him as "the Son of David" and as the long-promised Messiah, they turned against him, screaming "Crucify him." Thus the Messiah went to the cross.

On the afternoon of Good Friday many of us will go to our churches and take part in services commemorating the Crucifixion of God's only Son, who died for us. It should be a time for self-examination. We

should each of us ask ourselves, Am I helping to crucify Christ afresh by my indifference, my self-centeredness, and my pre-occupation with the effort to make a living and establish a reputation?

Our lesson title suggests that "the cross calls us." It dies indeed. It calls us to renewed loyalty to Christ, who lives to today, not as a wandering Teacher garbed in robe and sandals, but in the spirit, everywhere present.

Look again at Titus 3:2. The ways of dealing with one another described in this verse constitutes one response to the call of the cross.
