"The cure rate for cancer climbed from one out of seven three in the late 1950's. Today butter. it could be one out of two if all cancer were diagnosed early and treated promptly. "Progress against cancer is at-

tributed to two major factors. First, developments in research which have resulted in new diagnostic techniques and improved methods of treatment. Second, response to public and professional education which has resulted in earlier detection, prompt treatment and better, more available facilities.
