Outside an automobile, and Corporal Carroll Boyce ruled death as suicide. The charge from the gun entered the left chest.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Forehand Bunch; a son Donald Lee Bunch, at home; three daughters, Joe Anne, Wanda Gay and Barbara Bunch, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd A. Bunch of the Rocky Hock section; a brother, Raymond C. Bunch of Rocky Hock and two sisters, Mrs. Otis Chappell of Holly's Wharf and Mrs. Ella Nixon of Edenton.

He was a veteran of World War II and member of the Rocky Hock Baptist Church where a funeral service was held Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The pastor the Rev. Thurman W. Allred, officiated, assisted by the Rev. J. Leonard Gerrald, pastor of Sandy Cross Baptist Church. Burial was in Beaver Hill Cemetery.

Edenton Police Make 50 Arrests In April

Chief of Police Leo LaVoie reports that during April police made a total of 50 arrests, of whom 48 were found guilty as charged. Miscellaneous traffic arrests headed the list with 17, followed by 15 arrested for being drunk.

Those arrested included 23 white males, three white females, 20 colored males and four colored females.

Fines amounted to \$232.50 and costs \$503.70, or a total of \$736.20, of which \$186.60 was turned over to the town in way of officers' fees.

Activities during the month included 69 calls answered and investigated, five accidents investigated, seven funerals worked, 24 courtesies extended, 18 doors found unlocked, two fire calls answered, 1,029 traffic citations issued, 11 lights reported out and 11 house checks. The police made 1,029 radio calls and were on the air one hour, 19 minutes and five seconds.

Firemen Respond To Nine Calls In April

Fire Chief W. J. Yates reports that Edenton firemen answered nine calls during April, five of which were in Edenton and four out of town.

For the Edenton fires the firemen were out four hours and 30 minutes and out of town six hours and 15 minutes. They were on the air 45 seconds in town and 40 seconds out of town.

Hose laid in Edenton was 1,000 feet and 750 feet out of town. Ladders were raised 22 feet in town and none out of town.

For the Edenton fires 65 volunteer firemen responded and 80 out of town. Property involved in town was estimated at \$13,100 and \$8,500 out of town. Damage in town was estimated at \$5,000 and none out of town. Insurance in town was \$9,000 and none out of town. Two fire drills were held during the month and two still alarms, one in Edenton and one out of town. There was one false alarm at Macedonia Church and three rescue calls with three men on duty 83 hours.

More than 40,000 men, 370 aircraft and 70 ships of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps took part in the exercise, scheduled by the U. S. Atlantic Command.

The exercise featured a full-scale, amphibious assault on Onslow Beach at Camp Lejeune, backed up by airborne troops and close air support from offshore.

It is the year's major joint test of the Atlantic Command's conventional warfare capabilities.
