Little Change In Official Family

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N. J. George coming in as low man. The members re-elected and their vote follows: O. C. Long, Jr., 1362; Marvin Evans, 1,339; Geddes B. Potter, 1,317; John M. Elliott, 1,297; Eugene N. Jordan, 1,255 and Garland H. Asbell, 1,154. Mr. George polled 802 votes.

In the race for Clerk of Court, Mrs. Lena H. Leary, incumbent,

outdistanced John F. White a little better than 4 to 1. Mrs. Leary polled 1,380 votes; while Mr. White received only 340 votes.

It was a much closer contest for Chowan County Representative in the General Assembly, in which Albert G. Byrum, incumbent, was opposed by B. Warner Evans. The vote was 867 for Evans and 821 for Byrum. Evans carried four of the six precincts, with Byrum's greatest strength showing up in the West Edenton precinct, where he had 320 votes against 257 for Evans. Evans' biggest majority was in Center Hill precinct, where he polled 106 votes to 54 for Byrum.

County officials who had no opposition were J. Clarence Leary, County Commissioner-at-large; Earl Goodwin, Sheriff; William Privott, Judge of Recorder's Court, and John Shackelford, Prosecuting Attorney of Recorder's Court.

Congressman Herbert Bonner also had no opposition for reelection and for District Senators N. Elton Ayldett of Elizabeth City and J. J. (Monk) Harrington of Lewiston there was no opposition.
