Farmers will be notified of their measured acreage as soon as they are computed. No information concerning planted acreage will be given out prior to mailing of the notices.

H. D. West, local ASCS office manager, urges farmers to contact his office immediately upon receiving the notice if they wish to make any adjustments. "There is a time limit on making requests for adjustments," says Mr. West. "You will be given seven days in which to notify this office of your intentions on tobacco excess acreage, 15 days on cotton, peanuts, corn and diverted acreage. Don't let the time limit pass and be penalized for being late."

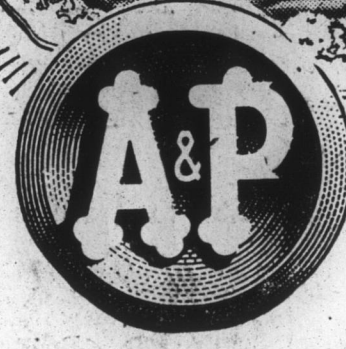
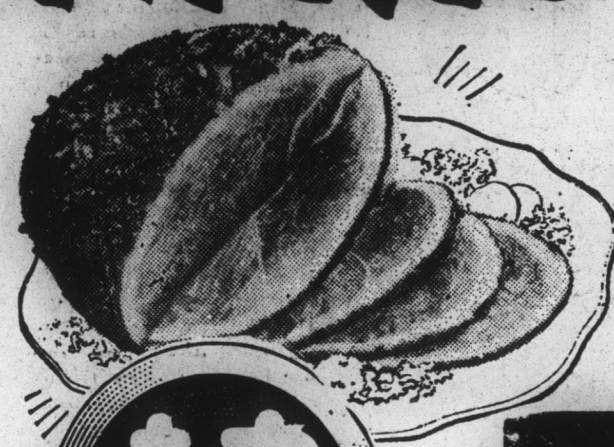
