Another in a series of articles in which the North Carolina Department of Transportation explores some of the significant facts behind last year's traffic accident toll.

Sometimes experience doesn't count! Nearly half of the drivers involved in fatal highway crack-ups in North Carolina last year had 11 or more years of driving experience. This was revealed in a special study by the State Department of Motor Vehicles of accident circumstances and conditions. The study further showed that a total of 1,438 drivers were involved in fatal wrecks, four of whom were learners under instruction at the time. Others included drivers with less than three months experience 6, three to six months 11, six to twelve months 14, one to five years 305, six to ten years 136 and not stated 232.
