

Duncan suggests a tremendous expansion in the teaching of tenmis, golf, handball, bowling, swimming, tumbling, wrestling, table tennis and croquet.

Not only are such sports a lifetime source of enjoyment, they can be a real factor in maintaining healthful vigor throughout life. Regular physical activity is a must for good health, Duncan said.
