

Schedule Announced For Chest X-ray Mobile Unit In District

A pre-planning conference for the chest X-ray mobile unit was held at the Health Department in Elizabeth City Tuesday. Dr. W. A. Smith, chief of the Tuberculosis Section of the State Board of Health was present, along with numerous representatives from the four counties. Dr. Smith discussed the progress that had been made in the eradication of tuberculosis in case finding and treatment since 1916.

In 1916 about 3,600 people died of tuberculosis with a state population of approximately two million people. In 1961, 174 people died of tuberculosis with a state population of approximately 4 1/2 million people. This in itself shows the progress that has been made in the control of tuberculosis.

For the past three years there has been approximately 1,100 active cases found each year, which is some indication that tuberculosis for the moment is at a standstill.

The case rate of tuberculosis per 100,000 population in 1961 for the United States was 29. The case rate for North Carolina for 1961 was 24. How-

ever, for the five year rate 1957-1961 for the four counties was 36.8. A breakdown for each county is as follows:

Camden County, 21.4; Pasquotank County, 37.5; Perquimans County, 50.1 and Chowan County, 32.4.

The schedule for the time and place of the mobile X-ray unit was adopted, which for Chowan County is as follows:

In front of the Betty Shoppe Saturday, November 24; Tuesday, November 27; Wednesday, November 28 and Thursday, November 29.

Dr. J. A. Johnson, district health director, also says that cards showing results of each individual's X-ray will be sent to them. These should be received in three to four weeks following date of X-ray. If most cases children under 15 years will be excluded as it has been found that tuberculosis occurs more frequently in the older group of people.

Any person found that needs a retake X-ray will be given this free of charge either at the Health Department in Elizabeth City or Hertford.

alerted to be on the lookout for the beads and would be asked to tell the public in their area the danger involved. It is said that as little as one-half a chewed bead could cause death in an adult, and that it takes from one to three days before poisoning symptoms develop. The symptoms include vomiting and diarrhea, following by collapse or death.

Other effects include kidney trouble and bleeding in the intestinal tract.

While State Food and Drug Division inspectors believe they have removed most of such necklaces from stores, some may still be on sale.
