

## Dr. William H. Schettler Assigned Health Director; Serves On Full Time Basis

### Successor to Dr. J. A. Johnson, Who Has Gone to South Carolina to Practice

With the recent resignation of Dr. J. A. Johnson as district health director, V. N. Darden of Hertford, chairman of the District Board of Health, announced last week that a full time director has been assigned by the State Board of Health. Johnson served as part time director.

The new director will be Dr. William H. Schettler, who will assume his new duties about the first of the year.

Dr. Schettler, unmarried, is 24 years old and attended elementary school in Asheville and high school in Fort City, Tenn. He took pre-med work at the University of Tennessee, was awarded a medical degree from that institution's Medical College in 1961 and this month completed his internship at Duval Medical Center, Jacksonville, Fla.

He visited the district last week and met district personnel and board members in Camden, Chowan, Pasquotank and Perquimans counties, which comprise the district.

Dr. Johnson has gone to Orangeburg, S. C., to engage in private practice.

## Full Agenda Holds Town Councilmen In Long Session

## Long Discussion Relative to Sewage System and Canopies In Business Section

Town Councilmen, meeting on Thursday night of last week instead of Tuesday night, were held in session until the midnight hour as the result of a full agenda.

The lion's portion of the meeting was taken up by a lengthy discussion of sewage plans on Cypress Street and the idea of constructing a canopy in front of business houses on Broad Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Murray Byrum attended the meeting and the sewage situation was discussed pro and con as the couple sought to learn why Cypress Street was not included in the sewage project. It was pointed out that prior to government financial assistance, the cost was considered excessive and that Cypress Street had never been dedicated to the town. Mr. and Mrs. Byrum expressed their opinion that all sections should be served by the new sewage plant. It was also pointed out that Cypress Street residents had not petitioned for the sewer line, which requires the petitioners to share in the cost. A petition was presented for the town to accept the street and it was understood that when an approximate cost can be secured, a petition will be presented for the sewage service.

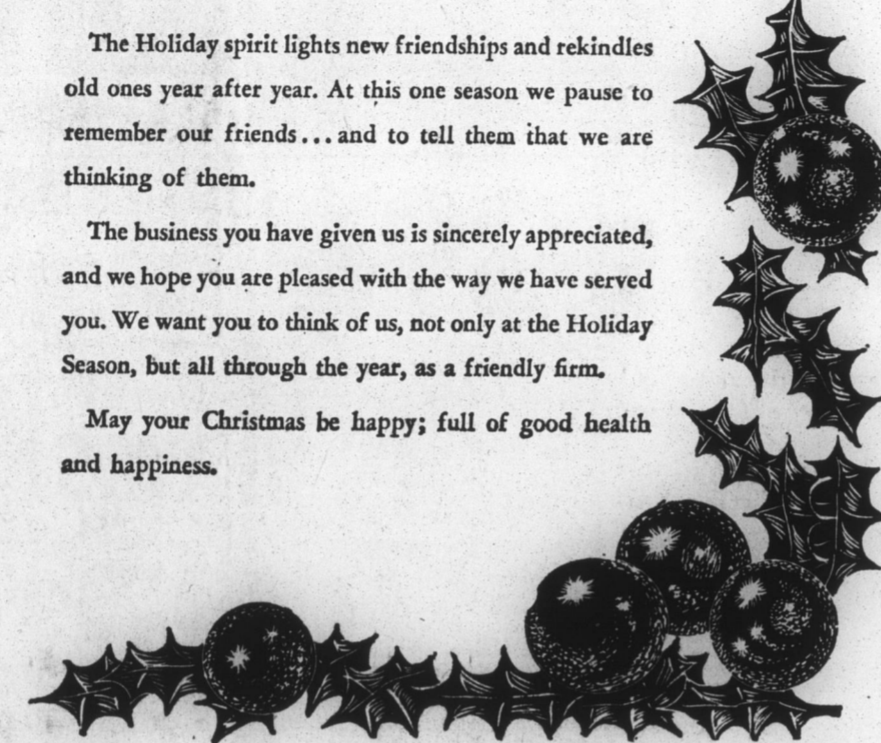

## National Guard Unit In Edenton Will Be Increased To 80%

## Local Unit Has Been Operating at Only 71 Per Cent of Company's Strength

The local unit of the North Carolina National Guard will increase to 80 percent strength as part of the national revamping of the National Guard.

Maj. Gen. Weston H. Willis, 20th Infantry Division Commander of the North Carolina National Guard, has announced the increase for all units of the 4th Division.

The local Combat Support Company in Edenton has been operating with 71 percent strength authorization, he said. Other units may become smaller or be disbanded.

Gen. Willis said even though the over-all strength of the National Guard was cut on a national basis, the North Carolina local Guard actually would be increased. This is because the 20th Division in North Carolina has been selected as one of four top flight divisions to be "beefed up" in strength and holiday for both teachers and students.

## Postgraduate Medicine Courses Scheduled Be Held In Edenton

## Holiday Store Closings

## Both State and Nation Vote Overwhelmingly In Favor of Farm Programs

Chowan County peanut and cotton farmers turned in an overwhelming majority in favor of peanut and cotton quotas in the referendums held Tuesday of last week. In both the state and nation there was also an overwhelming majority in favor of the quotas.

In Chowan County 56% of cotton growers visited the polls to cast their votes and 53% of the peanut growers voted. 399 voters voted in favor of cotton marketing quotas, and 6 voted against. 336 voters voted in favor of peanut marketing quotas and 4 voted against. 275 voted in favor of the authorization collection of 10 cents per bale to be used for improvements and research on cotton. There were 13 voters voting against.

The total number of votes that have been cast in the three previous cotton referendums in the States was 26,675 for the 1960 referendum, 25,949 votes for the 1961 referendum and 58,539 votes in the 1962 referendum. The total number of votes cast in the 1960 peanut referendum was 19,126. Listed below are the unofficial results of the 1962 referendums held on December 11:

**State**  
Cotton quotas: For, 27,555; against, 522; total vote, 28,077.  
Peanut quotas: For, 12,094; against, 67; total vote, 12,161.  
Cotton promotion: For, 25,349; against, 1,197; total vote, 26,546.

**National**  
Cotton quotas: For, 201,169; against, 13,488; total vote, 214,657.  
Peanut quotas: For, 40,872; against, 1,277; total vote, 42,149.

As noted above, the total number of votes cast exceeds both the 1960 and 1961 referendum totals.

A native of Atlanta, Dr. King is a graduate of Morehouse College and holds a B.D. degree from Crozier Theological Seminary at Chester, Pa., and a Ph.D. degree from Boston University. He rose to fame as leader of the Montgomery, Alabama, bus protest.
