Chowan Purchases 60.1% Of Savings Bonds Quota In 1962

U. S. Savings Bonds sales in Chowan County during 1962 amounted to \$68,245, according to W. H. Andrews, state volunteer Savings Bonds chairman. This is 60.1% of the county's annual quota, which was \$113,520.

Total sales in North Carolina were \$48,305,335. This is less than \$65,000 or 1/10 of 1% behind the 1961 sales. This amounts to 94% of the state's annual quota of \$51,000,000.

Negro High School Named In Honor Of D. F. Walker Principal For 31 Years

School Trustees Make Change In Name Effective on Wednesday, January 16

The Board of Education of the Edenton City Schools at its regular monthly meeting on the evening of January 16 named the Edenton High School in honor of the Principal, D. F. Walker. The official name of the school is D. F. Walker High School and became effective on the evening of January 16, 1963.

Professor Walker was born at Scottsboro, Alabama, and attended the public schools of Scottsboro and Talladega, Alabama. His formal education consists of a bachelor degree from Talladega College, Talladega, Alabama, a masters degree from Hampton Institute, Hampton, Virginia, in administration and supervision, and another masters degree from New York University in educational administration, and summer study at A & T College in Greensboro, N. C., and Teachers College, Columbia University, New York. Walker served as principal of the Northampton County Training School, Garysburg, N. C., from 1929 to 1932. He came to Edenton in September, 1932, on the recommendation of Dr. Newbold, then director of the Division of Negro Education in North Carolina, and has served as principal of the Edenton High School for the past 31 years. He has directed the school's growth from eight teachers to a faculty of 50 teachers and has the school accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Mr. Walker is married with no children and lives at 104 East Freemason Street in Edenton. He will continue to serve as principal of the school.

After serving as principal of the Edenton colored high school for 31 years, Edenton School Trustees at their meeting Wednesday night of last week named the school in honor of him. As of January 16, the school will be officially known as D. F. Walker High School.

Program Is Tied In With Carolina Tercentenary Observed During Year

The Pilgrimage of Colonial Edenton and Countryside, sponsored by the Edenton Woman's Club, will be held April 19, 20 and 21.

The biennial tour will be held in connection with the Carolina Charter Tercentenary being observed this year in North Carolina.

As Edenton, then known as "ye towne on Queen Anne's Creek," was one of the first towns settled and served as capital of the colony for over 49 years, it is rich in the history of the 100 years between 1633 and 1763 designated for the observance.

Nearly half of the historic houses and buildings are to be open for the tour date from this period. Edenton's town and county homes are nationally known for their authenticity and fine state of preservation. The Pilgrimage is the only time that the privately owned houses are open to the public. Proceeds of the tour are used for restoration and preservation.

This year's tour, promising to be one of the most outstanding, includes Hayes, begun 1789, the home of Samuel Johnston, early governor and first U. S. Senator from North Carolina; James Irell House, 1757, home of Irell, first Associate Justice of U. S. Supreme Court; the Carolina House, ca 1725, fine Jacobean style; Sycamore, 1660, oldest house in North Carolina; Chowan Court House, 1767, finest Georgian Court House in the South, as well as many other places of historical and architectural interest.

Houses will be open Friday and Saturday from 10 A. M. to noon and 2 P. M. to 5 P. M., and Sunday from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M. Block tickets will be \$4 with individual admittances 50 cents.

To provide for the greatest number to visit these historic sites, Mrs. W. W. Byrum, Jr., chairman, has announced that special rates will be provided for school children and groups of 20 or more. For information write Pilgrimage, Box 422, Edenton, N. C.
