

Bloodmobile Is Scheduled To Visit Edenton Monday, May 13

Citizens of Chowan County are reminded that the Red Cross bloodmobile is scheduled to be in Edenton Monday,

As usual, the quota for this visit will be 100 pints and it is forcefully pointed out that if the county does not reach its quota this time, the Red Cross blood program for the county is in jeopardy and will most likely be discontinued.

A special appeal is sent out to rural citizens as well as colored people, who in previous visits showed comparatively little interest in donating blood when at the same time these two groups have consumed the major portiton of blood used at the local hospital.

Chowan County fell down miserably at the last bloodmobile visit, so that Dr. Archie Walker, chairman of the blood program, urges citizens to go to the Edenton armory Monday, May 13, from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. to donate blood which is so much needed and essential in relieving suffering and saving lives.
